CHAPTER I

AXIS OF SIGNAL COMMUNICATIONS

The axis of Signal communications for the First Brigade, A.F.G., will be Coblenz-Cochending-Trimbs-Hausen-Monreal-Kaisersech-Ursfeld; for the Second Brigade, A.F.G., will be Coblenz-Andernach-Sinsig-Ndr.Breisig-Lantershofen-Gelsdorf-Altenahr-Honningen-Antweiler-Musch-Berweiler.  
The same axis will be used on the return march.

CHAPTER II

PLAN OF TELEPHONE AND TELEGRAPH SYSTEMS

Signal Corps personnel from these Headquarters will establish and maintain Telephone and Telegraph communications down to Brigades. Regimental and separate unit commanders will be responsible for the communications within their units, and up to Brigades.

A Signal Detachment consisting of one officer and ten men will be attached to each Brigade, and will have supervision of communications within the Brigade. Under no circumstances will permanent circuits be molested without permission from the Signal Officer of Advance Headquarters.

In calling a unit, the code name will be habitually used.

CHAPTER III  
RADIO PLAN

The assignment of calls and other characteristics will be made by the Radio Officer and furnished directly to the units concerned.  
Radiograms pertaining to operations and movements of troops will be in code.

CHAPTER IV  
VISUAL SIGNALLING PLAN

Visual Signalling stations will be established under the direction of Unit Commanders.  
Neither pyrotechnics nor panels will be used.

CHAPTER V  
COURIERS AND MOTORCYCLES

Couriers and motorcycles will continue to operate under the direction of the Message Center. Daily courier service between Advance Headquarters and each Brigade Headquarters will leave the Message Center at 9 hours and 15 hours.

CHAPTER VI  
OFFICIAL TIME

Time will be given out daily at 12 hours to Brigade Headquarters. All time instruments will be synchronized by this time.  
Commanding Officers will be charged with obtaining and distributing the time to their organizations.

CHAPTER VII  
SPECIAL AGENTS

Upon notification from Advance Headquarters, officers to act as Special Agents will be designated by Brigades and furnished proper motor transportation.

I. COMMUNICATIONS.

A. Plan of Service. Railways.

1. All troops and services desiring transportation will make application for it daily before 16 hours to G-4-T these Headquarters. The request will state number of personnel, kind of materiel, weight in tons, bulk in cubic yards, and points between which it will be transported.

2. Priority will be fixed by these Headquarters.

3. Officers requesting transportation will be notified at once of the time and place of spotting and delivery, where they will provide the necessary details for prompt handling.

B. Plan of Service. Motor Transport.

1. When acting independently Brigades are provided with their own motor transport, and they will assure their transportation from Railheads forward.

2. Motor transport assigned organizations for garrison and other duties and above their table of organization (A.E.F. Dec. 1918) allowance, will be turned in to the M.T.O. at Telegraph Barracks and used by him to maintain a pool for COBIENZ during the manoeuvre. Personnel operating this transport will remain with it. It will be returned to organizations on completion of manoeuvres.

C. Roads.

1. Roads will be controlled by Brigade Commanders in their own areas.

2. Engineers assigned Brigades will effect the necessary repairs to their own roads.

2. Class 2, 3 and 4 Supplies, G.O. 44, G.H.Q., 1918, will be delivered at Railheads only upon requisition.

3. No requisitions for supplies and equipment will be made on the inhabitants except by authority of the C.Q.M., these forces.

#### C. Ammunition.

1. Small Arms. No small ammunition will be carried by any troops except Military Police. The amounts prescribed to be carried in the combat trains and in ammunition carts will be so carried.

2. Artillery. One day's fare will be carried in caissons.

3. Organization commanders will cause an inspection to be made August 29th by an officer of each man and vehicle to see that provisions of paragraphs C. 1 and 2 are carried out.

4. Requests for additional ammunition will be made on the Chief Ordnance Officer twenty-four (24) hours in advance who will deliver it at Railhead designated.

#### III. ENGINEER WORKS.

A. These will be as prescribed by Brigade Commanders

B. Water points will be established by Brigade Engineers

#### IV. EVACUATION.

A. Brigades will establish necessary dressing stations and field hospitals.

B. They will evacuate their own sick with their own material to Base Hospital, COBLENZ.

C. Medical Supplies will be delivered at designated Railhead on requisition made on Medical Supply Dept, COBLENZ. twenty-four (24) hours in advance.

#### V. SANITARY.

A. Existing orders with reference to property accountability will obtain.

B. Railhead officers will accept articles for Reclamation Depot when accompanied by proper supporting papers.

#### VI. STRAGGLERS

Brigade commanders will, with the Military Police assigned them, collect all stragglers from units of their Brigades and dispose of them as the cases warrant.

#### VII. MEN FOR CONFINEMENT

Men to be confined at COBLENZ will be collected daily at Brigade Headquarters and the Prisoner Marshal, A.F.G., at Advance Headquarters notified. He will send for them.



I. COMMUNICATIONS.

A. Plan of Service. Railways.

1. All troops and services desiring transportation will make application for it daily before 16 hours to G-4-T, these Headquarters. The request will state number of personnel, kind of material, weight in tons, bulk in cubic yards, and points between which it will be transported.

2. Officers requesting transportation will be notified at once of the time and place of spotting and delivery, where they will provide the necessary details for prompt handling.

B. Plan of Service. Motor Transport.

1. Organizations and Chiefs of Services desiring transportation will make request for it daily before 16:00 hours to G-4-T, these Headquarters and will be notified at once of their allotment.

C. Roads.

(a) (1) Southwest of line ULMEN-UESSTONGARD-BONGARD-NOHN, the traffic control will be in charge of the Nth Corps.

(2) The A.F.G. Division controls traffic within the Division Area, northeast inclusive of the above line.

(b) Organization of Traffic Control: See Sketch "A" herewith.

(1) Within the Division limits proscribed above the traffic control will be organized and operated by the Division A.P.M.

(2) Engineers working on roads will have the same authority as military police to assist in traffic control and will take vigorous action in breaking blockades. Proper M.P. arm insignia will be furnished Engineer Officers, N.C.O.'s, and such privates as necessary.

(3) Traffic priority: (A) Rations. (B) Ammunition. (C) Engineer supplies.

II. SUPPLIES

A. Railroad: ADENAU.

1. Distributing Points:

1st Brigade:	MULLENBACH on ADENAU ROAD
2nd Brigade:	MANNEBACH, north end of town
All other Troops:	KELBERG, on KELBERG-BONGARD ROAD

2. Class 2, 3, and 4 Supplies, G.O., 44, G.H.Q., 1918, will be delivered at railheads upon requisition.

3. No requisitions for supplies and equipment will be made on the inhabitants except by authority of the Chief Quartermaster, these Forces.

C. Ammunition.

1. Requests for ammunition will be made on the Chief Ordnance Officer 24:00 hours in advance.

2. Ammunition dump: junction HÜNERBACH - BEREBOEN and KELBERG-BOOS ROADS.

### III. ENGINEER WORKS.

A. Water points will be established by the Chief Engineer, distinctly marked, and location communicated to Brigades and separate organizations.

B. Engineer dump: junction KOTTELBACH-KELBERG and BOOS-KELBERG Roads.

### IV. EVACUATION

2. A.F.G. Sanitary Train will take station at KELBERGER, M. The C.O. Sanitary Train will establish collecting stations for the 1st Brigade at MULLENBACH, and for the 2nd Brigade at MANNEBACH. The Division Triage will act as collecting station for Divisional Troops. All sick will be evacuated through the division triage at KELBERGER M. and thence to COLENZ, via ADENAU

### V. SALVAGE

A. Existing orders with reference to property accountability will obtain.

B. Railhead officers will accept articles for the reclamation Depot when accompanied by proper supporting papers.

### VI. STRAGGLERS

1. The Corps straggler line is approximately 6 km. from the front line.

2. The Division will establish two straggler lines, as follows: One line approximately 100m. in rear of collecting stations. A second line approximately 3 km. in rear of the first line.

3. (a) The Division Straggler lines will be established and maintained by the Division A.P.M.

(b) The same post may be used as a traffic control post and as a straggler control post.

4. Instructions: The Division straggler lines will cover the first aid stations, roads, paths, trails from the front, and no enlisted men will be permitted to pass to the rear without written authority except the walking wounded. Walking wounded will be required to bring with them their full equipment. All posts will be instructed with reference to the location of first aid stations, nearby headquarters, their divisional collecting stations, destination of roads, nearby water sources, and traffic regulations.



PLAN OF INTELLIGENCE



CIRCULATION

East of the MOSSBRUCK - KELBERG - MULLENBACH road following rules regarding circulation will be followed:

I DAY -

(a) TROOPS:- Troops in bivouac during the day will keep under cover in villages or in woods. When moving there will not be more than three (3) men in any one group and there will be at least twenty-five (25) yards between any two groups. When the alert is sounded troops will take cover in buildings, cellars or woods.

(b) TRANSPORTATION:- Transportation and animals not in use will be kept under cover in towns or in woods.

(c) Until further orders no motor transportation with the exception of staff and reconnaissance cars will be allowed east of the line BEREBORN - HUNERBACH - ROTE HECK; (639.8)

(d) All work in the open will be ~~concealed~~.

II NIGHT -

(a) TROOPS:- No fires will be lighted out of doors. When it is necessary to show a light to designate a dressing station or collecting point, lights will be dimmed and screened so as not to shine upwards. No other lights will be carried or shown out of doors. All windows and doors will be screened so no lights inside of a building will show outside.

(b) TRANSPORTATION:- West of the line BEREBORN - HUNERBACH - ROTE HECK (639.8) the following rules regarding use of lights on motor transportation will be observed:-

1. No bright headlights will be allowed at any time on any car or truck, but tail lights may be carried at all times.
2. Staff cars and ambulances may carry side lights or dimmed headlights at all times.
3. On clear nights a lantern or dim light may be carried by every tenth truck in a convoy.
4. On misty or stormy nights, trucks may carry any lights except bright headlights.
5. No lights of any kind will be used on vehicles east of above line.

III Convoys will be under the charge of an officer and will be formed into sections of not more than ten each with an officer or N.C.O. in charge. The last truck in each section will display a red disc or flag in the rear. No truck will approach nearer than 50 meters of a truck moving in the same direction displaying a red disc or flag.

IV Standing instructions, in regard to circulation on the road and traffic control, not in conflict with the above, will be strictly enforced by the Military Police and given the strictest attention by all, in order that congestion and blocks may be avoided.

V The following cross-roads and road junctions will be avoided as much as possible: - Cross roads two and one half ( $2\frac{1}{2}$ ) kilometers east of HUNTERBACH, elevation 565.1; Road junction one half ( $\frac{1}{2}$ ) kilometer south of WELCHERATH.

VI After September 7th no one except General Officers will be allowed to proceed to the rear from the railhead without a Staff Officers' pass, or a special pass from Division or Brigade Headquarters.

VII The Military Police will see that the provisions of this order are strictly complied with.

PLAN OF DEFENCE - A.F.G. DIVISION.

1. Mission of the Nth Army Corps:

(a) To hold its established positions between KAISERSECH, (incl.) and ADENAU, (incl.).

2. Mission of the A. F. G. Division:

(a) With brigades in sector, to organize and to hold, at whatever cost, the position of resistance, and to insure the possession of the out-post position in case of local unimportant attacks.

(b) With troops assigned to the reserve position, to organize and to hold that position pending the arrival of Corps Reserves.

(c) At all times, and with all troops, to be prepared to assume the offensive when so ordered.

3. Organization of the defensive position:

(a) Successive positions -

1. Outposts - The ridge south of MUNK (incl), and south of BOOS, thence to a point one (1) kilometer northwest of HIRCHBACH.

2. Position of resistance - The ridge approximately  $1\frac{1}{2}$  kilometers in rear of the forementioned ridge to the BOOS - KELBERG highway, thence through point 517, one (1) kilometer east of REIMERTH, thence to WELCHERATH.

3. Reserve position - Hill 474, one (1) kilometer west of RETTERATH. Hill 505, one (1) kilometer south of MANNEBACH. Hill 587, one (1) kilometer north of BEREBOORN, thence to wooded ridge running in a general northwesterly direction to ROTE HECK (Hill 339).

(b) Zone of action, Nth Division:

Eastern limit, (adjacent to Xth Division), MUNK (incl.), RETTERATH (incl.), UERSFELD (excl.).

Western limit - The DREES - WELCHERATH road to WELCHERATH - WELCHERATH (incl.), - MULLENBACH, (incl.).

Limit between Brigade Sectors:

Hill 557,  $1/2$  (one-half) kilometer northwest of BOOS, (to the right sector), Hill 573, two (2) kilometers west of BOOS, (to the right sector), DIEDRICHS - BUSCH, (to the right sector), HUNNERBACH, (to the left sector).

(c) Outpost position:

Garrison one-third (1/3) of Infantry of each Brigade in sector. This is the zone in front of the position of resistance. It is organized for defence by a limited garrison to deny the enemy favorable ground in which to employ his short range artillery, and to form up his infantry for launching an assault against the position of resistance. The garrison of this position must also assure the necessary time for the occupation of the position of resistance. As a general rule the garrisons of the outpost positions must be located beyond the range of hostile mortars. The infantry of the outpost position will be disposed in combat groups, organized in checkerboard formations, provisioned and wired for all around defence and grouped in mutually supporting strong points, permitting an effective development of machine gun and automatic rifle fire. Small reserve groups must be located in rear of the combat groups with the main mission of immediately counter-attacking in case of successful local attacks by the enemy, and with the secondary mission of furnishing small Cossack posts and sentry squads in advance of the combat groups. The intervals between strong points must be covered by artillery fire.

4. CONDUCT IN CASE OF ATTACK. (Outpost Position).

(a) Expected attack:

In the event that information is obtained accurately forecasting a general attack, and sufficient time is available for the purpose, the strength of the garrison of the outpost position will be reduced by half; the troops withdrawn being used to reinforce the position of resistance. Those remaining on the outpost position will fight to the last. The partial withdrawal of the outpost troops stated above will only be carried out upon authority of the Division Commander.

(b) Surprise Attacks:

In the event that the enemy succeeds in launching a general attack without warning other than a short artillery bombardment, no retirements of any character will be permitted. All must fight in place and to the last.

(c) Position of resistance:

This is the Zone, in the rear of the OUTPOST POSITION, on which the Brigades will engage the enemy with the bulk of the available troops. The position must be maintained intact; no retirements of any character from this position will be permitted. All must fight in place and to the last. All considerations regarding the defense of the Corps front must be based primarily upon the defense of this position.

It consists of a series of supporting points forming a continuous defensive line, all located beyond the range of the enemy's mortars, and covering the combat positions of our artillery.

At least 50 percent of the infantry and machine gunners assigned to this position, must live normally on the position and in the immediate vicinity of their combat positions, so that rapid occupation of combat posts will not be prevented or disorganized by the hostile artillery preparation. The remaining infantry must live normally within 1/2 hour's march of the position.

The infantry in the position of resistance will be organized into supporting groups so as to cover the entire front with fire.

IN CASE OF EXPECTED ATTACK

The position of the garrisons of the position of resistance not quartered on that position will be placed in close proximity to their combat positions. Should the attack come suddenly the sound of the hostile bombardment will be the ALERT ORDER and all troops will at once proceed to their combat positions.

The Artillery will cooperate in the defence of the position of resistance:-

- by delivering a fire of counter preparation with
- the maximum number of guns possible.
- This is the principal mission of the Artillery in defense.

COUNTER ATTACKS

In the event of a serious offensive, counter attacks will not be launched into the Zone of the Outpost Position from the Position of Resistance unless the enemy has been definitely checked in front of the latter position. The order for such counter attacks will emanate from the Division Commander.

In the event of a small attack or raid on the outpost position, counter attacks will be launched from the position of resistance to retake the ground lost in the outpost position upon the order of the Brigade Commander.

Should the position of resistance be penetrated by the enemy, the larger portion of the available troops will be employed on the flanks of the breach to limit the extent of the rupture; smaller forces being employed to confront the enemy's direct pressure. As soon as the expansion of the breach is checked, counter attacks must be delivered against the flanks of the hostile progression.

Plan of Supply, Communication and Evacuation - Same as Annex No. 1,

6. GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS

(a) Tactical connecting groups: Each Brigade Commander in sector will maintain close tactical connection with the Brigade on the right and left by means of joint posts established on the outpost position, and position of resistance.

(b) Transmission of Alert: Brigade commanders will be responsible for the prompt transmission of the alert order to all troops located within their sectors, for the prompt execution of the measures prescribed for an alert and all other measures necessary for the defence.

7. COMMAND. Brigade Commanders in sector are charged with the defense of their sector.

1. (a) The enemy occupies, with four Divisions, the general line DUNGENHEIM - NACHTSHEIM - DREES and thence the heights to the east of ADENAU. He is withdrawing along our front in the general direction of MAYEN, but is offering a stubborn resistance with Machine Guns and Artillery, supported by small groups of Infantry. He has been driven from his entrenched positions on the heights to the northeast of KELBERG, and in our immediate front his outpost positions are established along the ridge to the northeast of MUNK, BOOS, and KIRSCHACH. He has no regularly entrenched positions but his Infantry and Machine Gunners are sheltered in individual rifle pits. (Situation similar to that confronting the 80th American Division before the attack of 1st November, 1918, in the MEUSE - ARGONNE OPERATION).

(b) The Nth American Army Corps occupies the line from KAISERSECH to ADENAU with five Divisions. The Zth Division is on our left and the Xth Division is on our right. The Corps will, on D day at H hour, attack the enemy's line from KAISERSECH to the heights east of ADENAU.

2. (a) The A. F. G. Division will attack, with two Brigades side by side and seize the line NACHTSHEIM, (incl), the NACHTSHEIM - NIEDER BAAR road to road crossing at elevation 504.9 - Hill 489 - Cross roads one kilometer south of NIEDER BAAR, thence the ridge to the northwest to the northern point of the pine forest one and one-half (1½) kilometers south of OBER BAAR.

(b) Zone of Action, A. F. G. Division:

Right - As at present to MUNK (incl), thence NACHTSHEIMER M. (excl) - NACHTSHEIM (incl).

Left - As at present to WELCHERATH (incl), thence WELCHERATH - DREES road to the crossing of KIRS - B., thence Hill 477.6 one and one-half (1½) kilometers east of DREES (incl), thence MITTEL-BAAR (excl).

(c) OBJECTIVES.

Inter-mediate Objective - With a view to reforming preparatory to launching the final attack, the advance will be halted on the line - draw running from NACHTSHEIMER M. northwest thru LIND and continuing in a northerly direction to road fork 300 meters west of HOLGERT B - thence to bridge over NITZ B, 300 meters southwest of NITZ - thence to BAUER M, and KREBS B, to left limit of secteur. From this line, the final assault will be launched at H plus 2½ (two and one-half) hours.

(d) Corps Objective - As described in Paragraph 2 (a). Upon reaching this objective, outposts will be pushed to the front, the position consolidated, and all troops prepared, at all times, to resume the offensive when ordered.

(e) Axis of Advance of Division - The BOOS - LIND - MAYEN Highway.

3. (a) 1st Brigade, A. F. G.

Zone of Action

Left - Same as left boundary of Division.

Right - Hill 557.3 (excl) - Hill 565.1 (incl) - HOLGERT B (Hill 551.1 (excl)), -cross roads one kilometer south of NIEDERBAAR (incl). This Brigade will attack at H hour.

(b) Second Brigade, A. F. G.

Zone of Action

Left - Same as right of 1st Brigade, A. F. G.

Right - Same as right of A. F. G. Division. This Brigade will launch its initial attack at H hour plus 20 minutes, thus assuring the possession on our part of the WEHRHOLZ by the 1st Brigade, before exposing the flank of the 2nd Brigade to the hostile fire from these heights. From H hour until H hour plus twenty minutes, the 2nd Brigade, A. F. G., will, by means of Artillery and Infantry fire, prevent the enemy attacking the exposed right flank of the 1st Brigade. This Brigade must finally insure the possession of the HOLGERT - B which dominates the Corps Objective along the entire front of the Division.

(c) Artillery - The A. F. G. Artillery Brigade, (each of the three batteries of the 2nd Battalion, 6th F. A., will be considered as representing a regiment. Battery F being a regiment of 155 mm Howitzers, Batteries D and E being considered as regiments of 75 mm Artillery), will open the Artillery preparation at H hour minus twenty minutes in accordance with plan for the employment of Artillery (Annex No. 1). Commencing at H hour E Artillery Regiment will, by successive concentrations, support the 2nd Brigade A. F. G. directly under the orders of the Brigade Commander and D Regiment will similarly support the 1st Brigade, A. F. G. F Regiment Artillery will be under the orders of the Division Commander, and will fire in accordance with the Plan for the Employment of Artillery, (Annex No. 1).

(d) Tanks - Of the ten (10) tanks assigned for the use of the Division, five (5) will be at the disposal of the Commanding Officer, 2nd Brigade, A. F. G., at KOLVERATH on D - 1 day at 18 hours; the remaining five (5) tanks will be at the disposal of the Commanding General, 1st Brigade, A. F. G., at HÜNERBACH at the same day and hour. Tanks will not be moved to their assault positions before the beginning of the Artillery Preparation. (Tanks will be simulated by Artillery Tractors, each tractor representing five (5) tanks).

(e) Accompanying Guns - Where the terrain permits of their use, 75 mm guns will be attached to assault battalions. Where, in the opinion of the Brigade Commander, it is impracticable to use 75 mm guns, 37 mm guns will be used.

(f) Machine Guns: One animal drawn Machine Gun Company will be assigned to each assault battalion. Plan for the use of long range Machine Guns, (Annex No. 2).

(g) Divisional Reserve - The Divisional Reserve will be:

One company of Infantry - 1st Brigade.  
Two companies of Infantry - 2nd Brigade.  
Two motorized M. G. Cos., Prov. M. G. Bn.,  
2nd Brigade.

Major d'Alary Fechet will command the reserve, which will assemble at 18 hours D minus 1 day at HUNERBACH. On D day at H minus 4 hours the reserve will move to DIEDRICHSBUSCH.

(h) Initial dispositions for attack:

All troops will be in their initial positions for the attack at H minus one hour. Supports and reserves will be closed well up on the assault battalions.

(i) Combat Connection: Combat connecting groups will continually maintain connection on both flanks of the Brigades between assault battalions, supports, and reserves with the corresponding units on their right and left. Connecting groups on the flanks of Brigades, will consist of one-half (1/2) platoon of Infantry, commanded by an officer, and a section of Machine Guns, detailed from each adjacent Brigade, and commanded by the senior infantry officer of the mixed detachment.

(j) Engineers: Company "A", 1st Engineers will be at the disposal of the Commanding General, 1st Brigade, and Company D, 1st Engineers at the disposal of the Commanding Officer, 2nd Brigade, from 6 hours D minus 1 day.

(x) Infantry will be well disposed in depth so as to insure its driving power and will advance at the rate of 100 meters in 4 minutes. An axis of advance will be assigned each Infantry Regiment.

PLAN OF INTELLIGENCE.

I. TRANSMISSION OF INTELLIGENCE.

In addition to the regular system of communication, special arrangements will be made for the immediate transmission, by means of runners, of important Intelligence information from the front. Routes of runners and method of transmission to G - 2, A. F. G. Division, will be similar to those prescribed in Annex No. 2 to F. O. No. "E".

Brigade I. O.s will keep G-2, A. F. G. Division, constantly informed of the location of the hostile line opposite his brigade front.

Divisional, Brigade and Regimental observers will advance with their units and progressively occupy points permitting the most extended view to the front and flanks, with a view to constant observation of the enemy and his movements. The vital necessity for continual observation of the enemy and the rapid transmission to the rear of information regarding his movements, cannot be too strongly emphasized.

PRISONERS.

Attention is invited to Annex No. 5, which prescribes that prisoners captured during the attack will be reported to G - 2 in DIEDRICHSBUSCH. The P. W. E. will remain in KELBERG.

Attention is directed to instructions regarding prisoners contained in Annex No. 2 to F. O. No. "E". These will govern during the attack.

LIAISON.

Par. V, Annex No. 2, F. O. No. "E", will govern.

LOCATION OF G - 2.

G - 2 will be at KELBERG until H plus 2 on D day, after which time it will move to DIEDRICHSBUSCH with Advance Headquarters, A. F. G. Division.

2. Class 2, 3, and 4 Supplies, G.O. 44, G.H.O., 1918, will be delivered at railheads upon requisition.

3. No requisitions for supplies and equipment will be made on the inhabitants except by authority of the Chief Quartermaster, these Forces.

C. Ammunition

1. Requests for ammunition will be made on the Chief Ordnance Officer 24 hours in advance.

2. Ammunition dump: Junction KELBERG-BOOS and KELBERG-KOTTELBACH roads.

3. Machine Gun Depots and spare parts: ZERMULLEN

III. ENGINEER WORKS

A. Water points will be established by the Chief Engineer, distinctly marked, and locations communicated to Brigades and separate organizations.

B. Engineer dump: Junction BOOS-KELBERG and KELBERG-MOSBRUCH Roads.

IV. EVACUATIONS

1. (a) The Sanitary Train, A.F.G., takes station at KELBERGER M.  
(b) Divisional Triage will be at KELBERGER M.  
(c) Gas Hospital will be located at KELBERGER M.  
(d) Divisional Stations for slightly wounded will be at KELBERGER M.  
(e) All sick will be evacuated to the Divisional Triage, KELBERGER M. to RAILHEAD at ADENAU.  
(f) Divisional Medical Supply Dump: KELBERGER M.

2. (a) The Commanding Officer, Sanitary Train, will establish an Advance Collecting Station for the First Brigade in vicinity of HUNERBACH

(b) He will establish the Dressing Station for the First Brigade at KELBERGER M.

3. (a) The Commanding Officer, Sanitary Train, will establish an Advance ~~Dressing~~ Station for Second Brigade at RETTERATH.

*Collecting*  
(b) He will establish a Dressing Station for the Second Brigade in the vicinity of SASSEN

4. Dressing Stations will be advanced with the attack on orders from these Headquarters and new locations will be reported to Brigade Commanders promptly.

5. Regimental Aid Stations will be established by regimental and separate organization surgeons after consultation with their commanders and their location communicated to Battalion commanders. The location of all dressing stations collecting stations and hospitals will be plainly marked. These will be located just outside of towns to avoid traffic congestion.

V. SAVAGE

A. Existing orders with reference to property accountability will obtain.

B. Railhead officers will accept articles for the Reclamation Depot when accompanied by proper supporting papers.

#### VI. STRAGGLERS

1. The Corps straggler line will be approximately the line HAUSEN-BOXBERG-BONGARD-NOHN.

2. The Division will establish the straggler lines, as follows: One line approximately 100 m. in rear of collecting stations. A second line approximately 3 km. in rear of the first line.

3. (a) The Division Straggler Line will be established and maintained by the Division A.P.M.

(b) The same post may be used as a traffic control post and as a straggler control post.

4. Instructions: The Division Straggler Line will cover the first aid stations, roads, paths, trails from the front, and no enlisted men will be permitted to pass to the rear without written authority except the walking wounded. Walking wounded will be required to bring with them their full equipment. All posts will be instructed with reference to the location of first aid stations, nearby headquarters, their individual collecting stations, destination of roads, nearby water sources, and traffic regulations.

5. The Division A.P.M. will establish a collecting station for stragglers at HUNERBACH with an officer in charge whose duty it will be to return stragglers to their organizations. The Station will be provided with rations and water.

#### VII. PRISONERS OF WAR

1. (a) Prisoners will be conducted by organizations which capture them to straggler line, where they will be taken over by the Military Police and conducted to Division Headquarters.

(b) All property, duly tagged, removed from the persons of the prisoners will be delivered with them to the Corps P.W.E.

(c) Convoy of prisoners will be by division in the front line to Corps P.W.E. at DAUN.

(d) Report will be made daily by 8:00 A.M. to G-1, showing separately the number of officers and men captured since the beginning of the operation.

#### VIII. EVACUATION OF ANIMALS

1. All sick animals will be evacuated to KELBERG where they will be collected by the Division Remount Service and evacuated.

#### IX. BURIALS

1. Personnel will not be buried but will be evacuated by ambulance to ADENAU.

2. Dead animals will be promptly buried by the organizations to which they belong.

CHAPTER I.



SUMMARY OF INTELLIGENCE.  
From 18 hrs. 8 Sept. 1920.  
To 18 hrs. 9 Sept. 1920.

I. GENERAL IMPRESSION OF THE DAY.

The recent aerial activity of the enemy still continues. Frequent reconnaissance flights over the division area and deep reconnaissance flights were made, while our front lines were machine-gunned and the important points in the division area were bombed a number of times during the 24 hr. period.

II. ENEMY FRONT LINE.

See situation map. No change.

III. ENEMY ORDER OF BATTLE.

(a) Identifications.- During the past few days prisoners from the 2nd, 8th and 11th Red Divisions have been captured on our front. This confirms previous reports as to the intermingling of enemy units.

(b) Presumed enemy order of battle:- From E. to W.:

11th Red Div.	:32nd Inf. Regt.
	:33rd Inf. Regt.
8th Red Div.	:24th Inf. Regt.
	:22nd Inf. Regt.
	:23rd Inf. Regt.
2nd Red Div.	:5th Inf. Regt.
	:6th Inf. Regt.

While the above is presumed to be the contemplated scheme of the enemy for the arrangement of his regimental units on our front, it is by no means certain that the regiments are posted in that order. The P.C. of the 8th Red Div. is presumed to be at WELSCHENBACH, while the P.C. of the 11th Red Div. is presumed to be at KURRENBERG. The P.C. of the 2nd Red Div. has not been located.

From the statements of prisoners it is presumed that the boundary between the 2nd and 8th Red divisions follows the general line: KIRSBACH - NITZ - OBERBAAR, while the boundary between the 8th and 11th Red divisions follows the general line: MUNK - NACHTSHEIM - road fork 523 on the BOOS - MAYEN road, the towns of MUNK and NACHTSHEIM being included in the sector of the 11th Red Division.

A noncommissioned officer of the 8th Red Division stated that he had overheard a conversation between two of his officers which indicated an early relief of the 8th Red Division.

(c) Comment on enemy units.- All three Red divisions mentioned, before the present American offensive, were considered good second class divisions. At the present time, they are very much depleted in strength, their retreat has caused confusion in their supply arrangements and the men claim they do not get sufficient food, and the morale is low. The 2nd Red Division came into line on 20 Aug., the 8th Red Div. on 10 Aug., and the 11th Red Div. on 15 Aug. All three divisions are tired.

Prisoners state that the strength of their companies is usually from 40 - 60 men; each infantry company has from 6 - 8 light machine guns in the front line. Heavy machine guns are in position in line and in support.

(d) Situation of enemy reserves.- The 4th Red Div., a third class division with depleted ranks, is at MAYEN. The 6th Red Division, a tired second class division with depleted ranks, is at LANGENFELD.

#### IV. ENEMY INFANTRY ACTIVITY.

The enemy patrols in our front are very active. The enemy outposts are very alert, and any approach to the enemy lines by our patrols is met by heavy bursts of machine gun and rifle fire. Our patrols have been fired on particularly from the enemy outposts N.E. of KIRSBACH, N. of BOOS and N.W. of MUNK.

#### V. ENEMY ARTILLERY ACTIVITY.

The enemy artillery is exceedingly active. Important roads and towns in the division area from HUNERBACH forward are frequently subjected to harassing fire, with 150s, 105s, and 77s. On 8 Sept. between 18 hrs. and 19:30 hrs. WELCHERATH was heavily shelled by 105s. At the same time BRUCK was subjected to a heavy shelling by 77s (20 to 30 shells per minute). Between 21 and 22 hours 8 Sept. RETTERATH was heavily shelled by 150s.

Gas is reported in the ravines in the KGL. FORST KAISERSESCH.

#### VI. ENEMY AERIAL ACTIVITY.

The hostile air service is exceedingly active. KELBERG, HUNERBACH and MANNEBACH were bombed during the night 8/9 Sept. The activity of the hostile air service continued during the night and the enemy planes frequently dropped flares in the endeavor to discover what movement was going on on the roads in our area.

#### VII. ENEMY MOVEMENTS.

Visibility fair. Considerable traffic in small groups during the day on roads running from DREIS, LIND and NACHTSHEIM to the E. and N.E. Considerable truck and wagon traffic on VIRNEBURG - KURRENBERG road in both directions.

#### VIII. ENEMY WORKS.

See situation map. The enemy has no prepared positions in our front. His lines consist of fox-holes and short trenches of no greater length than 30 meters, except on especially advantageous positions along his line of resistance, where some company trenches have been constructed. He has practically no wire. See Part II.

IX. MISCELLANEOUS.

Since 5 Sept. the division has captured the following materiel: 3 150s, 4 105s, 5 77s; 50 light, 13 heavy M.G.s; 11 trench mortars.

The total number of prisoners passed through the division cage since 5 Sept. is as follows: 9 officers, 218 E.M., total 227.

X. ENEMY INTENTIONS.

From statements of prisoners and information furnished by the Corps, it is apparent that the enemy outposts will withdraw in case of attack but that the line of resistance will endeavor to hold out to the last.

XI. ACTIVITY OF OUR OWN TROOPS.

Usual patrol activity. Our air service has been very active, making frequent reconnaissance flights, bombing the rear areas of the enemy, and machine-gunning his lines in our front.

PART II.

FOX-HOLES.

The phrase "fox-hole" is used by the German soldier, as determined from the examination of large numbers of prisoners, to describe a hole in the ground sufficient to give shelter from splinters and perhaps from the weather also, to one or two soldiers. In general, there are two types. One is a hole in level or nearly level ground, usually a deepened shell hole, some of them having improvised overhead cover from shell fragments and shelter for protection from the weather. The other is a hole in steeply sloping ground, such as a railroad embankment, the bank of a stream, the deep ditch of a road or the steep slope of a hill. These are often partly closed in with wood or tin, covered with dirt, in order to increase protection from the weather. Protection from shell fragments is given by the surrounding earth and not by the covering, except in rare instances where a considerable amount of earth has been piled over the covering. The fox-holes in level ground as a rule give best protection against shell fragments, but the fox-holes in steep slopes give better shelter from the weather and are more easily constructed. Consequently the second type is somewhat more frequently found than the first type.

In some cases these fox-holes have been so located that they could be linked up into a defensive line. In most instances there does not appear to have been any such purpose in the siting of the fox-holes. A battalion at rest or in support needs shelter from artillery fire and from the weather, and promptly digs in, preferably where it is protected from observation. Within certain limits, the men use their own judgment in choosing the location of their own shelters. When the battalion moves away a new set of fox-holes is dug. The constant shifting of troops results in great numbers of fox-holes scattered over the front line and support areas. The discovery of fox-holes at any point cannot by itself be taken as indicative of the existence of a line of resistance.

PLAN OF MACHINE GUNS

1. Assignments of Machine Guns to Infantry Units:

The Machine Gun Company of the 8th Infantry will be assigned to the Assault Battalion of the 8th Infantry.

The Machine Gun Company, 5th Infantry, will be assigned to the Assault Battalion of the 5th Infantry.

The Machine Gun Company, 50th Infantry, will be assigned to the Assault Battalion of the 50th Infantry

One platoon of Company "A", 7th M. G. Bn., and one platoon of Company "A", Prov. M. G. Bn., will be assigned to the connecting groups maintaining contact between the First Brigade and Second Brigade, (One section to the support line and one section to line of Reserves).

One platoon of Company "B", 7th M. G. Bn., will be assigned (one section to support line and one section to reserve line) to the connecting groups maintaining contact between the First Brigade, and the 2th Division on our left.

One platoon, Company "B", Prov. M. G. Bn., will be assigned, (one section to support line, and one section to reserve line), to the connecting group maintaining contact between the Second Brigade and the 2th Division on our right.

One section of the M. G. Co., 8th Infantry, will be assigned to each of the connecting groups maintaining contact between the assault battalions of the First and Second Brigades and the First Brigade and 2th Division on our left.

One Section, M. G. Co., 5th Infantry, will be assigned to the connecting group maintaining contact between the assault battalions of the First and Second Brigades.

One section, M. G. Co., 50th Infantry, will be assigned to the connecting groups, maintaining contact between the assault battalions of the Second Brigade and the 2th Division on our right.

Above Machine Gun Organizations will come under command of Infantry Unit Commanders at 19 hours, D-1 day.

2. Barrage Fire:

The following units are designated for barrage fire:

Co. "A", 7th M. G. Bn., (less one platoon)  
Co. "B", 7th M. G. Bn., (less one platoon)  
Co. "A", Prov. M. G. Bn., (less one platoon)  
Co. "B", Prov. M. G. Bn., (less one platoon)

The barrage guns will come under the command of the Brigade Machine Gun Officers at 7 hours D-1 day, but will not move from their present positions until 19 hours D-1 day.

The barrage mission ceases at H plus 3 hours, but all guns will continue under orders of the Brigade Machine Gun Officers and will remain in the positions they occupy at that time until further orders.

3. Mission prior to "D" day:

No firing will be carried out prior to "H" hour minus 2 minutes.

4. Missions on "D" day:

For positions of companies and assignments to targets, see Appendix No. 1.

Times of fire given in Appendix No. 1, are general guides for the firing of the platoon or company. Company and platoon commanders will check the clearances of friendly troops by each gun. Following data to be used in calculations:

Jumping off of Infantry is Hill 504.4, south of MUNK - HILL 513.8 - BOOS - SCHNEE B. - HILL 800 meters west of SCHNEE B. - KIRSBACH - Point 488 N. W. of KIRSBACH on WELCHERATH-DREES road.

Rate of advance of Infantry is 100 meters in 4 minutes.

5. Occupation of initial positions:

The machine gun units designated for barrage fire will have initial positions as follows:

- Co. "B", 7th M. G. Bn., (less one platoon) along the edge of woods from 446.3-392.4 to 447.3-391.7
- Co. "A", 7th M. G. Bn., (less one platoon) along edge of woods on N. W. slope SCHNEE B.
- Co. "A", Prov. M. G. Bn., (less one platoon) SCHNEE B.
- Co. "B", Prov. M. G. Bn., (less one platoon) Hill 504.4 S. W. of MUNK.

Company and platoon commanders will reach the vicinity of their initial positions before 18 hours D-1 day for the purpose of making reconnaissance of their positions and the ground to their front. Companies will proceed to their initial positions as directed by their respective Commanding Officers at 20 hours D-1 day.

6. Advance of platoons to successive positions:

See Appendix No. 2.

7. Ammunition:

Companies will establish dumps in the vicinity of initial positions as follows:

Each barrage company will establish a dump in the vicinity of its initial position with 100,000 rounds of ordinary 30 cal. ammunition.

Belt loading stations will be established by each barrage platoon.

8. Signal communications:

Visual signalling, runners, telephones and couriers as provided in Annex No. 3, to Field Orders No. "F", A. F. G.

The Division Machine Gun Officer will be at Headquarters, A. F. G. Division.

9. The above missions of the long range machine guns, under the direction of the Division Machine Gun Officer, may, in case of necessity, be altered or modified by Brigade Commanders who will, in each case, immediately notify these Headquarters of such changes.

### I. PLAN FOR THE EMPLOYMENT OF ARTILLERY

(a) This Brigade will support the attack of our Division by means of heavy concentrations on Sensitive points as herein prescribed. The Commanding Officer, "D" Regiment Field Artillery (75m/m) will support the 1st Brigade, A. F. G., and be under the orders of the Commanding General of the 1st Brigade for orders and assignment of targets in his Zone of Advance from "H" hour. The Commanding Officer, "E" Regiment of Field Artillery (75 m/m) will support the 2nd Brigade, A. F. G., and will be under the orders of the Commanding General 2nd Brigade for orders and assignment of targets in his Zone of Advance from "H" hour. The Commanding Officer "F" Regiment of Field Artillery, (155 m/m) will remain with the Artillery Brigade Headquarters, for the entire period of the attack, to fire at such objectives as directed on the entire front of the Division's advance. The Regimental Commanders of "D" and "E" Regiments will report in person to the Brigade Commanders of the 1st and 2nd Brigades respectively at "H" hour.

#### (b) Assignment of Missions.

##### "D" Regiment of Field Artillery (75 m/m).

1. At H-20 minutes a heavy concentration of H.E. and 1/4 smoke shell will be placed along the entire front of the enemy defenses opposite the 1st Brigade (as indicated by enemy Organization, Map G-2, A.F.G. Division, 9 September, 1920) to be continued until H hour. Rate of fire 4 rounds per gun per minute and one gun per Battery to rest at all times for cooling, cleaning and oiling. This concentration to be thickened and increased at points indicated as particularly sensitive.

2. One Battery at H-10 minutes to put down a heavy concentration on Redoubt on crest 1000 meters north KIRSBACH for a period of 10 minutes.

3. One Battery will put down a heavy concentration on enemy strong points leading up the shoulder of WEHRHOLZ to the crest 565.1 fire will be given from H-7 to H Hour at the rate of 5 rounds per gun per minute.

##### "E" Regiment of Field Artillery (75 m/m).

1. At H-80 minutes entire Regiment will fire a heavy Gas concentration in the woods LINDERWALD and woods south-east of BOOS around point 450. Rate of fire 5 rounds per gun per minute, and one gun per Battery to be rested at all times for cleaning, oiling and cooling. At H-20 one Battery will be left firing Gas on these woods till H Hour, and the remainder of Regiment will be changed to other objectives as hereafter prescribed.

2. At H-20 minutes a heavy concentration of H.E. and 1/4 smoke shell will be placed by remaining Batteries along the entire front of the enemy defenses opposite the 2nd Brigade (as indicated by enemy Organization Sketch G-2, Hqs. A. F. G. Division, 9th September 1920) to be continued until H Hour. Rate of fire 4 rounds per gun per minute and one gun per Battery to rest at all times for cooling, cleaning and oiling. This concentration to be thickened and increased at points indicated as particularly sensitive.

##### "F" Regiment of Field Artillery (155 m/m).

1. At H-20 to H+40 one Battery to counter Battery enemy 77 m/m Battery on the north slope of WEHRHOLZ.

2. At H-20 to H+40 one Battery to counter Battery enemy 77 m/m Battery located 500 meters S.W. of point 477.6 (East of DREES).

3. One Battery to counter Battery enemy 77 m/m Battery located to the immediate east of LINDERWALD from H-20 to H+40.

4. One Battery to counter Battery enemy 77 mm Battery located at 100 meters west of cross road (MAYEN ROAD) 504.9 from H-20 to H+60.

5. One Battery to counter Battery enemy 77 m/m Battery located at 1000 meters N.E. of HOLGERT B. from H - 20 to H + 60.

NOTE: All Batteries mentioned herewith for counter Battery work are shown on the sketch of enemy Organizations G-2 Hqs. A.F.G. Division, 9th September, 1920, and can be adjusted upon D-1 Day, by the aid of aerial observation.

6. One Battery of the 3rd Battalion will fire on the road crossing 483 north of NACHTSHEIM from H-20 to H + 40, and then with one Platoon until H + 180.

7. One Battery to place a concentration on the town of LIND from H + 40 to H + 100.

8. One Platoon to harass the road crossing 1 kilometer south of NIEDERBAAR from H + 40 to H + 180.

9. One Platoon to concentrate on the town of NITZ from H + 40 to H + 120.

Rate of fire in all cases to be not greater than 2 rounds per gun per minute for concentrations less than 40 minutes. For firing periods of 40 minutes or more on the same targets one round per gun per minute. One gun per Battery to be at rest at all times for cleaning, oiling and cooling.

II. All requests for Ammunition and fuses will be made to the Brigade Ammunitions Officer not later than 15 Hours D-1 day.

III. Echelons will be moved forward by order of Regimental Commanders at the end of the establishment of the new positions when the Corps Objective is attained.

IV. Headquarters, Field Artillery Brigade, at UESS till 17 Hours 9th September, then at KELBERG until H + 2 hours, then at DIEDRICHSBUSCH.

"The 2nd Brigade in the vicinity of URSFELD.

"Brigades and attached troops will then return to their proper station, marching and maneuvering, in accordance with Field Orders "G", c. s., these Headquarters."

3. Paragraph 3, page 2, above mentioned letter, is amended to read as follows:

"Based on the above instructions, Brigade Commanders will submit to these Headquarters, daily, twenty-four (24) hours in advance, their plans for the marching and maneuvering of their Brigades from 11 - 16 September, 1920.

MEMORANDUM FOR:

All recipient of FIELD ORDERS NO. "F".

1. During the attack prescribed by this order, the enemy will be outlined by Cavalry Troopers. The mounted troopers will represent Machine Gun nests; dismounted troopers will represent platoons of Infantry.
2. These troopers will fall back successively as the Umpires allow the attacking Infantry to advance against them.
3. The advance will be held up by the Umpires when, in their opinion, the outlined enemy would be able to check the assault. The Umpires must, in every case, permit the assaulting troops to finally advance.
4. A critique, to follow problem four (4), will be held at BOOS at 14 (fourteen) hours, 10th September. All commanders down to and including Battalion Commanders, will be present with their Staff, together with all Umpires. This will not interfere with the movement of troops prescribed in Field Orders "G". Units will be commanded by the second in command until the proper organization commanders join their units upon completion of the critique.





I. COMMUNICATIONS

A. Plan of Service. Railways.

1. All troops and services desiring transportation will make application for it daily before 16:00 hours to G-4-T, these Headquarters. The request will state number of personnel, kind of material, weight in tons, bulk in cubic yards, and points between which it will be transported.

2. Priority will be fixed by these Headquarters.

3. Officers requesting transportation will be notified at once of the time and place of spotting and delivery, where they will provide the necessary details for prompt handling.

B. Plan of Service. Motor Transport.

1. Motor Trains will not be mixed with horse trains nor with foot or horse troops.

a. Roads.

1. Roads will be controlled by Brigade Commanders in their own areas.

2. Engineers assigned Brigades will effect the necessary repairs to their own roads.

II. SUPPLY

A. Distributing Points.

1. Field rations, gasoline, forage and wood will be distributed to Regiments and Separate organizations at Railway stations as follows:

2. Hay, gasoline and wood will be distributed at Railway stations to regiments and separate organizations as follows:

3. Regular issues will be made at established garrison Railheads September 16th and thereafter.

5. No requisitions for supplies and equipment will be made on the inhabitants except by authority of the C.Q.M., these forces.

B. Ammunition.

1. Ammunition on hand in organizations at the end of the manouever will be retained by them, the amounts so retained being promptly reported to the Chief Ordnance Officer.

III. ENGINEER WORKS

A. These will be as prescribed by Brigade Commanders.

B. Water points will be established by Brigade **Engineers**.

IV. EVACUATION.

A. Brigades will establish necessary dressing stations and field hospitals.

B. They will evacuate their own sick with their own material to Base Hospital, COBLENZ, except that Hospital Train will be available for evacuations for First Brigade, September 11th and 12th at ALTENAHR.

C. Medical Supplies will be delivered at designated Distributing Points on requisition made on Medical Supply Depot, COBLENZ, twenty four (24) hours in advance.

V. SALVAGE

A. Existing orders with reference to property accountability will obtain.

B. Quartermasters at Distributing Points will accept articles for Reclamation Depot when accompanied by proper supporting papers.

VI. STRAGGLERS

Brigade commanders will, with the Military Police assigned them, collect all stragglers from units of their Brigades and dispose of them as the cases warrant.

VII. MEN FOR CONFINEMENT

Men to be confined at COBLENZ will be collected daily at Brigade Headquarters and the Provost Marshall, A.F.G. at Advance Headquarters notified. He will send for them.
