3. On 18 December 1951, about 75 NKA troops, armed with one (1) anti-tank gun, one (1) mortar and three (3) light machine guns, were at YB046925.
4. On 18 December 1951, about 30 NKA anti-guerilla troops were in a village at YB184934.
5. On 18 December 1951, about 45 NKA troops were at HAMDONG (YB218937).
6. On 18 December 1951, about 200 NKA troops, armed with three (3) heavy machine guns and one (1) 80mm mortar, were at KANGCOUCHON (YB249896).
7. On 18 December 1951, about 50 CCF troops were in a house 200 meters north of the village at XC938044.
8. On 17 December 1951, about 100 NKA troops were at HUGUNDONG (YB953003).

3. On 21 December 1951, about 500 CCF troops arrived in YOCHON (XC764177) at 2200 hours from CHONGYON (XC835354). There was a CCF company command post 200 meters south of YOCHON.

4. On 21 December 1951, about 20 CCF troops were at XC798200.

ITINERARY: BU7418, TAEGONG NI (BU7615), SOKTAL LI (BT7805), SOKHYON NI (BU7603), CHILSONGDAE (BU7601), NAMJONG NI (BU7296), SUAN (BU7086), SOKKYO RI (BT8478), TAEUL LI (CT9577), CHIHA RI (BT9977), SONGJONG NI (CT1068), ICHON (CT1661), NAMJWA RI (CT2562), OKTONG NI (CT3557), POKKYE RI (CT4855), PYONGGANG (CT5152), WON NI (CT4846), WOLCHONG NI (CT4641).

1. On 16 December 1951, approximately 50 NKA engineers went south from SOKTAL LI (BU7805) toward HOL TONG (BU7804).

2. On 16 December 1951, the following information was obtained at HOLTONG gold mine (BU786032):

a. Two (2) trucks, with bumper markings "C-1007" on the rear of one (1) truck and "Co-1038" on the other, were in the gold mine.

b. Twenty-three trucks with 50 drivers and assistants. The trucks were loaded with firewood and went north.

c. The gold mine was operative and employed approximately 2,000 personnel.

d. Approximately 50 NKA troops, about 50 percent armed with "SH's and sub-machine guns, were at the mine.

e. Six (6) CCF female nurses were at the mine.

f. Residents of the area stated that a NKLP conference was to be held at HOLTONG gold mine and representatives from SUAN (BT7086), KOKSAN (BT9794), ICHON (CT1561) and SINGYE (BT8564) Counties would attend. (F-6)

3. On 16 December 1951, approximately 30 NKA troops armed with M/N rifles and "SH's, went north toward NAMJONG NI from HOLTONG.

4. On 16 December 1951, the following information was obtained at NAMJONG NI gold mine:

a. There was a sign which read "CCF 351".

b. The mine was not operative and all the shafts, buildings and installations were used by the CCF.

c. The total strength of the CCF in the vicinity of the mine was approximately 20,000 troops.

d. Approximately 500 trucks, the majority of them empty, with bumper markings "61-0187", "61-0188", "61-0189", "61-01", were waiting to be loaded with supplies. Trucks with similar bumper markings, "61-01xx, were in evidence all the way south to ICHON (CT1561).

e. Consecutive road markings of "2" were placed south from NAMJONG NI to the front.

f. Mine shafts, buildings and bunkers had electric lights from a transformer installed underground.

g. Supplies of grain, flour and timber were stored in the mine shafts.

h. About 400 chickens were being raised by the CCF for food.

i. There was a Consumers Society Restaurant and a CCF Officers Restaurant.

j. Each shaft had two (2) or three (3) guards.

k. Air strafing seemed to be ineffective and some anti-aircraft guns were heard firing when friendly planes appeared.

l. There was heavy truck traffic on all the roads in the area.

m. The CCF had ample food supplies consisting of sorghum, beans and canned goods. These foods were also for sale on the open market and peddlars were selling soap, cigarettes and other Chinese made items.

n. The CCF troops were working hard to make themselves comfortable for the winter.

o. This area was a semi-permanent supply base and transportation center.

p. On 13 November 1951, the price of an apple was NK ₩ 25, and on 16 December 1951 the price was NK ₩ 100

5. On 16 December 1951, approximately 3,000 CCF troops went north toward YONYANG (YD3822) from south of SUAN (7086). They were unarmed but had their personal equipment and 80 horse-drawn wagons containing grain and other food.

6. On 16 December 1951, about 45 empty trucks went north through SUAN and about 60 trucks, loaded with flour, fat and oil drums, gasoline and ammunition boxes, went north.

7. On 17 December 1951, approximately 7,000 CCF troops were marching north between SUAN and SOKKYO RI (BT8478). They were unarmed but had their personal equipment, 100 horse-drawn wagons loaded with rice, and seven (7) trucks, each containing 40 CCF troops. Their uniforms were tattered but nutrition and morale was good. In addition to the transient troops there were numerous CCF troops in the valleys and villages in the SUAN-SOKKYO RI Area.

8. On 17 December 1951, there were signboards at ORYU DONG (BT738843) which read: "Logistical Supply Point of the 2nd Transport Unit"; "57th Det"; "Former 4th Unit"

9. On 17 December 1951, approximately 200 CCF troops went north through YAKSU DONG (BT829795) toward YONG YANG. About 20 percent of them were armed with type 99 Japanese Rifles, M/N rifles and sub-machine guns.

10. On 18 December 1951, the following information was obtained between CHIHA RI (BT9977) and SONGJONG NI (CT1068):

a. A sign reading "YALU RIVER", with an arrow pointing toward WONSAN (CU6535).

b. About 200 CCF trucks, loaded with flour, beans and ammunition boxes, went south-east. One hundred and eighty (180) CCF trucks, the majority empty, some loaded with empty gasoline drums, went north-west.

c. Two (2) trucks and about 100 NKA troops went north-west.

d. There were air-warning stations and CCF entrenchments all along the route.

11. On 19 December 1951, there was a sign at SONGBUNG NI (CT146658) which read "PAEKTU SAN", with an arrow pointing toward WONSAN.

12. On 19 December 1951, there was an anti-aircraft gun and 70 CCF troops on a mountain top at CT145670.

13. On 19 December 1951, there was an anti-aircraft gun and 30 CCF troops at CT147650.

14. On 19 December 1951, there was an anti-aircraft gun at CT154651.

15. On 19 December 1951, approximately 100 NK police were in an airshelter at ICHON (CT1661).

16. On 19 December 1951, about one (1) kilometer south of ICHON there were 15 trucks, loaded with flour, moving south, and 15 empty trucks moving north.

17. On 19 December 1951, approximately 70 CCF troops and 30 empty wagons moved north through MURUNG NI (CT2565). Residents of the area gave the following information:

a. There were numerous CCF troops and an anti-aircraft unit near MURUNG NI. (F-3)

b. Grain supplies from the north were assembled in MURUNG NI and then distributed to units in the south. (F-3)

- c. There was a CCF armored unit in the area. (F-3)
- d. The 2nd CCF Army was being replaced on the central front by the 6th CCF Army. (F-6)
- e. Each CCF platoon would have a pig from MANCHURIA for the New Year Holidays. (F-6)
- f. One (1) of the residents earned his living by secretly buying grain, salt and oil from a CCF unit. (F-3)

18. On 20 December 1951, there were two (2) T-34 tanks in a revetment and 30 unarmed CCF troops at CT333605.

19. On 20 December 1951, approximately 1,500 CCF troops were disposed between MURUNG NI and OKTUNG NI (CT3557).

20. On 20 December 1951, a CCF Korean interpreter stated that there was a beancurd plant in the mountains near OKTUNG NI which supplied beancurd to nearby CCF units. The plant produced three (3) big mats of beancurd per day. (F-3)

21. On 20 December 1951, there was a clothing supply dump and 30 CCF troops at CT414569. Part of the supplies were in a bunker and the remainder were in a field stored in 16 stacks, each measuring six (6) feet wide, six (6) feet long and seven (7) feet high, and covered with corn stalks.

22. On 20 December 1951, there was a sign reading "55th Artillery Unit" at CT418572, and about seven (7) guns were heard firing in the area.

23. On 20 December 1951, there were strong defensive trenches north of POKKYE RI (CT4855). These trenches were called the 2nd Defence Line, with the 1st Defense Line about four (4) miles south of PYONGGANG (CT5152).

24. On 20 December 1951, approximately 700 unarmed CCF troops were in POKKYERI. Thirteen (13) of the troops were repairing wagons.

25. On 20 December 1951, about 50 patrols went south through PYONGGANG.

MISCELLANEOUS INFORMATION:

- 1. The air-warning system is well set up in NK with rifle shots being relayed from one (1) peak to the next.
- 2. The NKA resents the arrogance of the CCF. There was a cemetery in SOKKYO RI for CCF and NKA troops, but only CCF troops were buried there, and the bodies of the NKA troops were thrown away. (F-3)
- 3. The assistant driver of each truck listens for air warning shots.
- 4. There were white signs all along the MSR to make driving easier at night.

1. On 19 December 1951, at MAECHON-NI (BT552284), there were approximately 2,000 NKA troops in houses, trenches and air-shelters. Troops were armed with 20 percent PPSH's, 20 percent M/Li carbines and 30 percent M/Li rifles. There were three (3) emplaced anti-aircraft guns on hill 287 (BT560281), and between a point 600 meters north of hill 287, there were six (6) emplaced 82mm Mortars, at 100 meter intervals.

2. From 191800 to 191930 December 1951, approximately 1,700 CCF troops (Elements of 40th Army) proceeded south from YONAK (BT505987) to BT675125. Arms were made up of 40 percent sub-machine guns, 30 percent PPSH's and 10 percent M/Li rifles.

3. There were about 4,000 bags of white rice stored in 10 air-shelters at BT556335.

1. At BT667365, 40 NKA troops of the 47th Division. Resident stated that they were from the 2d Platoon, 6th Company, 2d Battalion of an Artillery Regiment of the 47th Division of the 1st Corps. Further stated area supplied from north by truck. (F-6)

2. There is a NKA hospital at BT550102, staffed with about 30 doctors and nurses. (C-3)

3. On 4 December 1951, CCF troops at BT525030, elements of the 17th Army, moved south to KAESONG (BT8505). They were replaced by a CCF mounted reconnaissance unit of the 119th Division of the 40th Army. Their strength is approximately 150 men, equipped with 40 percent PPSH's and 40 percent M/N carbines. 2. Residents of TANGJON NI (YC2562) stated crops very poor due to shortage of fertilizer, labor and inadequate handling. Too, the food levy of last year has been increased 150 percent. Further stated that universal military training compulsory for all males and females between ages 18-35. This program is under direction of the Fatherland Protection Society. (F-6)
3. On 17 December 1951, at SINHWANP'Ō (YC2759), one (1) NKA soldier and 20 laborers graveling near damaged bridge at YC272600. Continuing to SARIWON (YC3965), approximately 30 CCF troops with concealed arms. Between SARIWON and MADONG (YC5060), approximately 20 trucks and trailers, loaded with clothing, moving north towards SARIWON. (C-3)
4. On 18 December 1951, at MADONG (YC5060), 40 CCF troops, fully armed and ready for commitment, proceeding south-east. At HUNGSU-RI (BT 4161), signboard which read CHANGKO HEADQUARTERS. Between HUNGSU RI and SOHUNG (BT5259), six (6) NKA soldiers and 60 laborers widening road at BT728595. At CH'Ō DONG (BT7759), 60 CCF transit troops with concealed weapons, apparently going south. (C-3) Resident stated that the NKA had established an airfield in UNGHUNG-NI (Unk), in MAEYANG MYON (BT6656). (F-6) On following day 20 NKA troops, fully armed, entered CH'Ō DONG. (C-3)
5. On 19 December 1951, at SINGYE (BT8564), 20 CCF troops without arms. At approximately BT9150 several mines laid. (C-3)
6. On 20 December 1951, in western sector of SIBYON NI (BT9942), three (3) CCF soldiers and heavy trenches. Between SIBYON NI and TOSAN (CT1240), 50 CCF troops armed with sub-machine gun and Type 99 rifles, with other arms concealed, proceeding north-west. Approximately 20 CCF troops on mountain north of TOSAN digging trenches. A CCF map was observed which showed that TOSAN was the CCF front line. Resident stated that at dusk CCF units usually assemble in TOSAN. (C-3)
7. In CHORWON (CT3437), sign which read "194th Unit", with arrow pointing east. On 220400 December 1951, at TAEMO-RI (CT3437), 30 fully armed CCF troops proceeded towards TAEMO-RI. (C-3)







The Komdok Mine, largest mine in North Korea, is classified as a first-class industrial establishment by the North Korean government (the NK government classifies its various industrial and economic establishments from 1-7, based on the ability of the concern to contribute to the military effort).
2. The mine is operated on a 24 hour per day basis. The most important ores produced here are magnesium, tin, iron. Large quantities of these ores are removed from the mine. The ores are of high quality.
3. Russian engineers and technicians are serving in an advisory capacity in and around the mine.
4. Approximately three thousand workers are employed in the mine, the majority of them being male. The workers are paid from 800-900 won per month. In addition, rations are distributed as follows: Laborers receive 5-6 hops of rice daily, depending on the job performed; clerks are allowed 4.9 hops per day; and the workers' families are allowed 2 hops per person daily. Uniforms are very hard for the workers to obtain. Most of the workers live in residences near the mine.
5. Equipment originally installed by the Japanese has been supplemented by more modern equipment from Russia. There is an adequacy of the equipment needed for the selection of ores. Numerous cable cars are used to remove the ores from the mine.
6. The ores are transported by trucks belonging to the NKPA transportation unit located at SINDONG MI (DA7535). Approximately 1200 NKPA soldiers belong to the unit. They live in civilian houses in SINDONG MI. The unit has approximately one hundred trucks. The trucks transport the ores from the Komdok Mine to Y. NKPA Railroad Station (DA7568). The ores are then transported by train to Manchuria.
7. The mine has not been damaged by UN aircraft.

1. Relapsing fever and eruptive typhus are prevalent in PUKCHONG (IW4255). Smallpox is prevalent in the SINPO (IW3331) and YANGHWA (IW3537) areas. Since February 1952 about 30% of the citizens have been affected with relapsing fever; since about 1 March 1952 about 7% of the citizens have been affected with eruptive typhus and smallpox.

2. The death rate of the relapsing fever is approximately 1% of the adult patients and 10% of the child patients. The death rate of the eruptive typhus is approximately 7% of all patients. The death rate of the smallpox is unknown.


3. Since the middle of February 1952 one preventive shot has been given the people; two shots have been given the army with imported medicine from China. The medicine name is unknown but the shot is given in the arm or back and causes a high fever for a period of three days.





6. On 22 April 1952, one (1) war factory has been organized with 15 office men, 20 casting technicians and 150 laborers, for the purpose of producing canteens, tooth paste, chalks.
7. On 22 April 1952, about 30 CCF and NKPA troops were guarding a factory producing rifles, bayonets, and other weapons the factory was located on the MSR between CHANGGOK RI (BS520995) YONAN UP and PUNGYANG RI (BT522010) YONBAEK GUN. The troops were armed with two (2) mortars, heavy and light machine guns and Russian rifles.
8. On 22 April 1952, 17 captured South Korean boats were hidden by pine trees at KUMGOK DONG (BT688012) KUMGOK RI YUCOK MYON YONBAEK GUN.

9. On 22 April 1952, a factory had been constructed complete with electricity and machinery, at FUNGYANG RI (BT522016) POWREP LYCH, for the construction of boats. The factory is supplied by trucks which carry food and clothes.



1. On 15 April 1952, one battery of CCF artillery, attached to the 194th Division, 65th CCF Corps, armed with two (2) anti-aircraft guns, two (2) direct firing weapons, 10 horse carts, 40 horses, and other Russian weapons, were at BS753943.

2. On 14 April 1952, approximately 50 CCF troops, equipped with horse carts and laborers, were repairing a bridge located at HANGYO (BT624058).

3. On 25 March 1952, an air strip, approximately 500 meters wide and 4,000 meters long, has been constructed approximately 100 meters east of the MSR, four (4) kilometers from SUDONG, FIONGYANG City (YD3822). This air strip was constructed with cement and covered with steel mats.

a. A school building located approximately two (2) kilometers south-east of the air strip, was being used as a ROK POW camp. From the air, this school building looks as if it had been completely demolished, but only the roof of this school is destroyed and the basement is in good condition.

b. At this POW camp, one (1) regiment of ROK prisoners were confined and were used as laborers to work 11 hours a day. 800 grams of rice and other foods were given to each POW daily for food. The POW's are named "Liberation Fighters", so rank is not acknowledged. The medical facilities for the POW's are so poor that its' dispensary is equipped only with such medicines as aspirin and iodine for immediate medical aid.

c. Also at the air strip, the 1st Regiment of the 219th NKPA Army Unit (known as a North Korean Air Corps Unit) was stationed. This regiment had approximately 200 troops working at the air strip with the ROK prisoners from the POW camp. This army unit is equipped with one (1) burp gun for every three (3) men, and 10 trucks.

4. On 28 March 1952, an air strip, approximately 500 meters wide and 4,000 meters long, has been constructed two (2) kilometers west of a bridge between HWANGJU (YC4283) and SARINOM (YC3965). About two (2) kilometers northeast of this base, one (1) regiment of ROK prisoners were located. Technical troops of the 3rd Battalion, 219th NKPA Army Unit, equipped with one bulldozer, four (4) motor cars, and two (2) tractors, were assigned to construct the air strip.

5. On 25 March 1952, one (1) company of CCF anti-aircraft troops, armed

with four (4) anti-aircraft guns and four (4) anti-aircraft machine guns were at SADOBI (YD4422).



e. Friendly guerrillas from Wolfpack landed on enemy beach at YC405018 on 30 April 1952. The enemy was contacted at YB374984, friendlies established a defense line at this point and engaged the enemy in a three hour fire fight. As a result of this fire fight, 1 NK Captain, 24 NKA soldiers were KIA, 1 Russian tractor was destroyed, 2 houses burned. 11 NKA were captured along with small arms and handgrenades. Friendly guerrillas withdrew.

f. At YB185807, Guerrilla Unit WP-4 with 20 men on 270200 I landed with mission of destroying or capturing six enemy boats. Boats had been moved prior to landing. Negative results.

g. At BS488828, Guerrilla Unit WP-2 with 128 men on 270130 I attempted to land at three points in vicinity and encountered heavy mortar fire at each point.

7. 6 July 52 - An NKPA troop concentration, consisting of 1200 personnel, is located at YD205375, near Son-gok (YD203371). These personnel are armed with an unknown number of PPSH sub-machine guns and Russian rifles. They are billeted in three (3) buildings in this area. (AIIR 7-8-52, F-) (Refugee Source).

8. Date Unknown - An NKPA Division, Headquarters, consisting of 1000 personnel, is located at YC132016, near the Naengjong-ni airfield (YD127005). This headquarters moved to this location in June 1952. The duty of these personnel is to defend the west coast of Korea. Source observed a large amount of officers and many female personnel at this location. (AIIR 9-8-52, F-) (Refugee Source).

9. 10 July 52 - A CCF troop concentration, consisting of 200 personnel located at YD416014, near Kwan-ni (YD410042). These personnel are equipped with one (1) 60mm mortar, three (3) heavy machine guns, five (5) light machine guns, an unknown number of Russian rifles, and two (2) hand grenades per individual. (AIIR 10-8-52, F-) (Refugee Source).

10. 27 June 52 - An NKPA troop concentration, consisting of 150 personnel, is located at Tae-dong (YD450555). These personnel are armed with six (6) heavy machine guns, nine (9) light machine guns, 20 PPSH sub-machine guns, and an unknown number of Russian and (US make) M-1 rifles, and two (2) hand grenades per man. They are billeted in 30 civilian houses situated irregularly throughout the village. (AIIR 15-8-52, F-) (Refugee Source).

11. May 52 - A CCF anti-aircraft gun position, consisting of 15 85mm anti-aircraft guns, is located at CT861713, near Hoehyon-ni (CT861703). These guns are installed in trenches. These guns are camouflaged with pine tree branches and weeds. 100 personnel are assigned to this area to operate these guns. They are billeted in the same trenches as the guns are installed. Seven (7) CCF personnel, armed with automatic weapons, are posted at each gun. (AIIR 5-8-52, F-) (Refugee Source).

12. 30 June 52 - An NKPA anti-aircraft gun battery, consisting of nine (9) anti-aircraft guns of unknown calibre and 80 personnel, is located at YD456204, near Miria-ri (YD470222). These personnel are armed with 160 hand grenades and an unknown number of PPSH sub-machine guns. These guns are installed in separate trenches. They are camouflaged with nets and tree branches. The mission of this unit is to defend Pyongyang, North Korea, from air attack. (AIIR 11-8-52, F-) (Refugee Source).

13. 28 June 52 - An enemy vehicle concealment, consisting of 50 trucks, is located at YD387256, near Taebanhyon (YD385253). The vehicles are concealed in the ground floor of a school. (AIIR 7-8-52, F-) (Refugee Source).

14. 6 July 52 - An enemy vehicular bridge is located at YD389210, near Tongdaewon-ni (YD394217). This bridge is 1500 meters long, 30 meters wide, and seven (7) meters above the water level. This bridge has recently been repaired. Two (2) CCF soldiers are posted at each entrance of the bridge and only military vehicles are permitted to pass over the bridge. (AIIR 7-8-52, F-) (Refugee Source).

15. 1 July 52 - A vehicular bridge, ten (10) meters long, and six (6) meters wide, is located at BT514018, near Wonu-ri (BT515025). 40 to 50 trucks from Yonan-up pass over this bridge every day. (AIIR 8-8-52, F-) (Refugee Source).

16. 19 June 52 - An enemy locomotive concealment, consisting of five (5) Chinese locomotives, is located between YD425000 and YD425997, near Kukkyo Railroad Station (YD425975). These locomotives are situated in a tunnel 300 meters long, 3.5 meters high and three (3) meters wide. The inner part of the tunnel is paved with concrete, the locomotives are concealed here between 0500 hours and 1900 hours. These locomotives transport supplies between Sinuiju and Sariwon. 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17. 1 July 52 - A CCF fuel storage, consisting of 4,000 drums of gasoline, is located at YD425356, near Sangchu-dong (YD424354). This fuel is stored in 50 trenches. This storage is guarded by 11 CCF personnel. (AIR 10-8-52, P-) (Refugee source).

18, 1 July 52 - A CCF food storage, consisting of 10,000 bags of wheat and 5,000 bags of koaling, is located at YD407332, near the Yongsong Railroad Station (YD408332). This food is stored in 40 civilian houses that have previously been damaged by bombing. 12 CCF personnel guard this storage. (AIR 10-8-52, P-) (Refugee Source).

The following UNVALUATED information has been compiled from Air Intelligence Information Reports, Headquarters, Fifth Air Force, Detachment #2, 6004th AISS.

1. Date Unknown - Agent training is being conducted by the 398th Unit, Social Safety Ministry of North Korea, at an unknown location in North Korea. The personnel trained for North Korean agents by this unit are mostly South Korean Labor Party members and agents of UN forces. Ten (10) per cent of these agents are female personnel. The training period is three (3) months for all personnel except captured agents of UN forces. They are friendly toward the personnel being trained. 30 personnel were being trained by this unit at the time source was receiving training.

- a. To obtain the forms and issuing methods of the 2nd Militiaman Registration Certificate, guide pass and Citizen Identification Cards.
- b. To join friendly intelligence unit and establish a Cellular System.
- c. To gather information pertaining to radio receiving frequency used by UN agents or UN cellular system in North Korea.

Personnel are given a code name when sent on a mission. Source was to meet another agent upon his arrival in MYONGYUN-DONG (GS235613). Agents that were dispatched into South Korea received 300,000 to 400,000 South Korean Won. Source was ordered to return to North Korea after one (1) year in South Korea. During this year he was to keep in contact with KIM Ho (金浩) (Korean), and KWON Shi Yong (權時永) (Korean). These enemy agents were to set up underground activities in the UN intelligence units. Source was to buy an identification card and guide pass from the 2nd Militiaman Registration Certificate, after entering South Korea. (AIR 530-7-52, C-) (Confidential Source).

2. February 52 - The 54th NAPA Army Unit, consisting of Army Communication, Ministry and National Security, is located at YD349332. These personnel are dispersed in Company strength, each consisting of 120 personnel, to PYONGYANG (YD365220), ANJU (YD287880), SONGHON (YD527673), KWON (CU490660), WORSAN (CU650350), CHOLLON (YD419179), KILJU (LA283340), NANAM (LA570174), HONGYONG (LA612987), SINGIJU (YD90395), and MANPOJIN (LA728588). They are equipped with one (1) light machine gun, ten (10) PPSH submachine guns, one (1) radio and an unknown number of telephones. The dispersed personnel are equipped with 60 PPSH sub-machine guns, 20 Japanese type 99 and type 38 rifles and 20 Russian rifles. One (1) guard is posted in this area (AIR 537-7-52, F-) (Refugee Source).

3. 2 July 52 - The 105th Tank Unit of the NAPA Mechanized Unit Command Post, consisting of 23 Soviet T-34 tanks and 200 NAPA personnel, is located at YD362188, near CHINGCHON-DONG (YD362192). The tanks are concealed in a tunnel. The tunnel has two (2) entrances, one (1) located on the eastern side of the hill and one (1) located on the western side of the hill. Iron poles, spaced at 50 centimeter intervals, are located ten (10) meters from the eastern and western entrance to the tunnel. The iron poles are surrounded with barbed wire entanglements. (AIR 531-7-52, F-) (Refugee Source).

4. 14 July 52 - An NAPA troop concentration of the 3rd Battalion, 239th Army Unit, consisting of 40 personnel, is located at KC762574. These personnel are equipped with one (1) 37mm anti-aircraft gun, one (1) heavy machine gun, 15 PPSH submachine guns, ten (10) Russian rifles, and two (2) hand grenades per individual. The 37mm anti-aircraft gun is installed in a trench. This gun is operated by eight (8) NAPA personnel and is camouflaged with pine branches. (AIR 546-7-52, C-) (Confidential Source).

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5. 15 May 52 - An NKA troop concentration, consisting of an unknown number of personnel of the 24th Heavy Weapons Brigade Headquarters, is located at CU638339, near WONSAN (CU650350). The mission of this unit and its subordinate units is to defend the eastern coastal area. Subordinate units of the 24th Heavy Weapons Brigade, are the 117th Unit, located at CU678345, Tank Company, located at CU683344, 175th Army Unit, (Heavy Machine Gun Company) located at CU634356, 175th Army Unit, (Artillery Company) located at CU641367. These personnel are not completely equipped with heavy weapons, but are equipped with normal infantry equipment. The personnel of these units are engaged in constructing an unknown number of caves, trenches, and gun positions in this area. Civilians are prohibited to pass within a one (1) kilometer radius of this location and an unknown number of NKA guards are posted at the restricted areas. Civilian personnel are not utilized in this area for construction work because of the fear of secrets leaking out (AIR 543-7-52, F-) (POW KIM Se Hyun (金世均) Source).

6. 1 July 52 - An enemy marine training unit, consisting of 130 personnel, is located at YC078898. These personnel are billeted in one (1) house. One (1) soldier, armed with one (1) PPSH submachine gun, is posted as security guard in this area (AIR 547-7-52, F-) (Refugee Source).

7. 22 June 52 - An enemy ammunition storage, consisting of 4,000 boxes of Russian rifle ammunition, is located in 40 trenches at HO-ONG-RI (BU685573) (AIR 531-7-52, F-) (Refugee Source).

8. 30 June 52 - An enemy hand grenade factory, consisting of 800 personnel, and an unknown number and type machine, is located at YC328924. This factory is located in two (2) trenches, each 100 meters long, five (5) meters wide, and four (4) meters deep, spaced at ten (10) meter intervals. The daily output of this factory is 900 hand grenades (AIR 549-7-52, F-) (Refugee Source).

9. 22 June 52 - A GCF antiaircraft gun battery, consisting of eight (8) 75mm antiaircraft guns and 100 personnel, is located at SOGU-RI (DU720544). Each antiaircraft gun is installed in one (1) trench. The personnel are billeted in trenches located east of the gun position. This unit has telephone contact with units in the SONGCHON area, and radio contact with units in PYONGYANG (YD385-220). This unit moved to this location on 20 May 1952, to defend PYONGYANG City (YD385220), and important establishments in SONGCHON-GUN (CU513525), against UN aerial attacks (AIR 531-7-52, F-) (Refugee Source).

10. 6 July 52 - An enemy mortar position, consisting of four (4) 120mm mortars, is located at DT378702. These mortars are concealed in four (4) trenches. These trenches are utilized as billets for 60 NKA personnel operating the mortars. An unknown quantity of ammunition is stored in these trenches. These personnel are assigned to the 8th Company, 3rd Battalion, 38th Artillery Regiment, 47th Division, 1st Corps. The command and observation posts are located at DT382697 (AIR 542-7-52, F-) (POW CHANG Hi Choon (張熙俊) Source).

11. 14 June 52 - An enemy anti-aircraft gun position, consisting of three (3) anti-aircraft guns, is located at DV460467, near YO-G-DO-G (DV472471). These guns are installed in trenches. These trenches and guns are camouflaged with nets and weeds. An unknown number of personnel are located in this area (AIR 552-7-52, F-) (Refugee Source).

12. 1 June 52 - A prisoner-of-war camp, containing an unknown number of ROKA personnel, is located at CHU-KUN-RI (CU557063). These personnel are under the direct supervision of the NKA 398th Replacement Regiment attached to the 3rd Corps, and consists of the following: 1st Battalion, 2nd Battalion, 3rd Battalion, Reconnaissance Company, Automatic Weapons Company, Antiaircraft Gun Company, and Anti-Tank Gun Company. The 3rd Corp, consists of 3,000 personnel. The ROKA are engaged in constructing an unknown number of caves at this location. They are billeted in an unknown number of houses and 11 caves of unknown dimensions.

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These personnel arise at 06:00 each day and receive 800 grams of rice and an unknown quantity of potatoes, salt, and beans each day. They are indoctrinated with communist teaching four (4) hours each week. Due to lack of sleep and insufficient food they are in poor physical condition. Three (3) NKPA personnel, armed with pistols, are posted as security guard. These guards are kind and considerate toward the prisoners. The prisoners-of-war in this camp are all corporals and sergeants, officers and major sergeants are transferred to an unknown location and are enrolled in the 398th Replacement Regiment (AIIR 534-7-52, F-) (POW GIANG Chang Ko (張昌浩) Source).

13. 8 July 52 - An NKPA General Headquarters, consisting of 200 officers, and 400 enlisted men, is located at YD376607. Ten (10) antiair trenches located behind the building. Four (4) NKPA personnel, armed with an unknown number of Russian rifles, are posted as security guard in this area (AIIR 536-7-52, F-) (Refugee Source).

14. 20 July 52 - A CCF troop concentration, consisting of 500 personnel, is located at BT613084, near KOUH-NI (BT607086). These personnel are equipped with 12 heavy machine guns, 17 light machine guns, 180 PPSH submachine guns, 230 Russian carbines, 30 (US made) M-1 rifles, 20 Japanese type 99 rifles and 1,000 hand grenades. They are billeted in 70 straw covered houses camouflaged with grass (AIIR 540-7-52, C-) (Confidential Source).

15. June 52 - An NKPA troop concentration, consisting of two (2) battalions of troops, is located at DONG-NI (DV283299). This concentration is the headquarters of four (4) detachments and two (2) companies of personnel are located in this area. These personnel are equipped with two (2) 75mm antiaircraft guns, an unknown number of anti tank guns, light machine guns, heavy machine guns, PPSH submachine guns, Russian rifles and handgrenades. Detachment #1, consisting of four (4) companies of personnel, is located at MAYANG-DO (DV296262). Detachment #2, consisting of 20 personnel, is located at DV331306, near SINPO (DV325313) (AIIR 544-7-52, F-) (Refugee Source).

16. 8 July 52 - An NKPA troop concentration, consisting of 300 personnel, is located at XYANGBONG (YD027972). These personnel are equipped with five (5) mortars, three (3) artillery guns, eight (8) light machine guns, and an unknown number of rifles and hand grenades. They are billeted in 20 houses. 22 NKPA personnel are posted as security guards in this area (AIIR 547-7-52, F-) (Refugee Source).

17. 9 July 52 - An NKPA troop concentration, consisting of 150 personnel, is located at YC024964. These personnel are equipped with two (2) artillery guns, four (4) light machine guns, 300 hand grenades, and an unknown number of Russian rifles. They are billeted in three (3) houses (AIIR 547-7-52, F-) (Refugee Source).

18. 8 July 52 - An NKPA troop concentration, consisting of 70 personnel, is located at LAN-DONG (BS502845). These personnel are armed with two (2) light machine guns, ten (10) (US made) M-1 rifles, 12 (Russian made) rifles, seven (7) carbines, 15 PPSH submachine guns, and two (2) hand grenades per individual. These personnel are billeted in 15 straw roofed houses. This area is guarded by two (2) guards, armed with one (1) Russian rifle and two (2) hand grenades (AIIR 550-7-52, F-) (Refugee Source).

19. 8 July 52 - An NKPA boat concealment, consisting of 12 boats of unknown type, is located at YB112853. These boats are camouflaged with trees and weeds. 150 NKPA personnel, armed with an unknown number of Russian rifles, M-1 rifles, and PPSH submachine guns, are located at this point. The duty of these personnel is to guard these boats and the coast line (AIIR 536-7-52, F-) (Refugee Source).

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20. 20 July 52 - A vehicular bridge is located at BT624057, near YANGHONG-NI (BT624056). This bridge is six (6) meters wide, 60 meters long, and constructed of concrete six (6) meters above the water. 20 vehicles, loaded with an unknown amount of ammunition and provisions, utilize this bridge each night (AIR 540-7-52, C-) (Confidential Source).

21. 17 July 52 - A vehicular bridge is located at YC450158, near CHOKCHON-NI (YC450150). This bridge is six (6) meters wide, 110 meters long, constructed of concrete two (2) meters above the water. 40 vehicles utilize this bridge each night (AIR 540-7-52, C-) (Confidential Source).

22. 2 July 52 - An NKPA truck concealment, consisting of seven (7) Russian GAZ trucks, is located at BS500984, near YOMAN (BS505988). These trucks are concealed in an unknown number of partially destroyed two (2) story houses spaced at three (3) meter intervals. They are guarded by the drivers (AIR 550-7-52, F-) (Refugee Source).

1. 25 April 52 - An enemy antiaircraft gun position, consisting of four (4) 76mm antiaircraft guns, is located at DV409551, near FUACHONG (DV415544). These guns are installed in four (4) trenches. One (1) platoon of personnel are assigned to man these guns. They are billeted in an unknown number of anti-air trenches. They are equipped with an unknown number of Russian rifles, PPSH submachine guns, and pistols. The gun positions are camouflaged with grass. One (1) guard is stationed at each gun and one (1) at the billets (AIIR 480-7-52, F-) (Refugee Source).
2. 7 July 52 - An antiaircraft gun position, consisting of one (1) 75mm gun and one (1) 45mm gun, is located at YC211496, near SIJONG-NI (YC217497). Each position is two and five tenths (2.5) meters in diameter and one and eight tenths (1.8) meters deep. 40 centimeters of the barrel of the guns protrude above the emplacement and are camouflaged with vegetation. 70 NKPA personnel were observed in this area (AIIR 489-7-52, F-) (Refugee Source).
3. 3 June 52 - An enemy factory, producing an unknown number of hand grenades, rifle ammunition, kitchen wares, and farm tools, is located at YD136064, near KANGSAN-NI (YD146067). This factory is located in two (2) buildings. 200 male and 30 female civilian personnel are employed by this factory and work during the day only (AIIR 481-7-52, F-) (PCW KIM Yong Moon (金龍久) Source).
4. 9 July 52 - An enemy factory, producing hand grenades, small arms ammunition and small arms accessories, is located at YC330502, near YONGIL-LI (YD325498). This factory is located in a cave five (5) meters high, five (5) meters wide, and 40 meters long. 297 personnel are employed at this factory, one (1) of these personnel guard this area (AIIR 498-7-52, F-) (Refugee Source).
5. 10 July 52 - An enemy factory, producing hand grenades small arms ammunition and small arms accessories, is located at YD320420. 400 meters northeast of the SUNAN Railroad Station (YD318413). This factory is located in a cave 144 personnel are employed at this factory, one (1) employee guards this location (AIIR 498-7-52, F-) (Refugee Source).
6. 11 July 52 - A CCF troop concentration, consisting of 160 personnel, is located at YD285426, near YONGBONG-SI (YD294427). These personnel are equipped with six (6) PPSH submachine guns, 80 Russian carbines, 20 Japanese (type 38) rifles, and 320 hand grenades. These personnel are billeted in six (6) antiaircraft trenches (AIIR 498-7-52, F-) (Refugee Source).
7. 15 July 52 - A CCF troop concentration, consisting of 250 personnel, is located at EP500043. These personnel are equipped with one (1) direct firing gun, two (2) mortars, two (2) heavy machine guns, four (4) light machine guns, and 150 Russian carbines. They are billeted in eight (8) anti-air trenches (AIIR 484-7-52, F-) (Refugee Source).
8. 20 July 52 - An NKPA troop concentration, consisting of 250 personnel, is located at BS561951. These personnel are equipped with two (2) 62mm mortars, four (4) light machine guns, 150 Russian carbines, and 500 hand grenades. They are billeted in five (5) anti-air trenches (AIIR 484-7-52, F-) (Refugee Source).

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9. 15 July 52 - A GCF troop concentration, consisting of 1,000 personnel, is located at BS486934, near SONGCHON-NI (BS498940). These personnel are equipped with four (4) 82mm mortars, three (3) 62mm mortars, four (4) anti-tank guns, 20 heavy machine guns, 20 light machine guns, and 500 Russian rifles. They are billeted in seven (7) caves (AIIR 486-7-52, F-) (Refugee Source).
10. 15 July 52 - An NKPA troop concentration, consisting of 1,500 personnel, is located at BS486993, near SONGCHON (BS498940). These personnel are equipped with three (3) 62mm mortars, five (5) anti-tank guns, 20 light machine guns and 600 Russian carbines. They are billeted in 11 caves. These caves are camouflaged with tree branches and grass (AIIR 486-7-52, F-) (Refugee Source).
11. 20 July 52 - A GCF troop concentration, consisting of 300 personnel, is located at BT508067. These personnel are equipped with two (2) mortars, three (3) heavy machine guns, eight (8) light machine guns, 200 Russian carbines, and 600 hand grenades. They are billeted in 12 anti-air trenches (AIIR 488-7-52, F-) (Refugee Source).
12. 19 July 52 - A GCF troop concentration, consisting of 500 personnel, is located at BT527051. These personnel are equipped with two (2) 75mm direct firing guns, six (6) heavy machine guns, 300 Russian carbines, and 1,000 hand grenades. They are billeted in 15 anti-air trenches (AIIR 488-7-52, F-) (Refugee Source).
13. 8 July 52 - A GCF troop concentration, consisting of 160 troops, is located at YC232471, near SANGDONG-NI (YC227475). This unit is equipped with two (2) heavy machine guns, four (4) light machine guns, 60 PPSH submachine guns, 100 Russian carbines, and 320 hand grenades. These troops are billeted in five (5) anti-air trenches (AIIR 489-7-52, F-) (Refugee Source).
14. 21 July 52 - An NKPA troop concentration, consisting of 160 troops, is located at BS553954, near SAJONG-NI (BS552955). This unit is equipped with three (3) heavy machine guns, seven (7) light machine guns, 90 PPSH submachine guns, 40 Russian carbines, and 320 hand grenades. The troops are billeted into five (5) anti-air trenches (AIIR 489-7-52, F-) (Refugee Source).
15. May 1952 - An NK Navy concentration, consisting of one (1) Battalion of personnel, is located at DV303346, near SO-DONG (DV295339). These personnel are equipped with three (3) artillery guns of unknown size, eight (8) heavy machine guns, eight (8) light machine guns, an unknown number of PPSH submachine guns, Russian carbines, pistols, three (3) telescopes, two (2) ZIS Soviet trucks, one (1) jeep, and two (2) radios. They are billeted in six (6) barracks. The mission of this unit is to guard the coast at SINPO (DV325314). The headquarters of this unit is located at CHAUNGBOJU-NI (DV285333). The personnel of this unit are dressed in Russian Navy uniforms. Five (5) personnel, armed with PPSH submachine guns, patrol the area from DV315355 to DV300344 (AIIR 490-7-52, F-) (Refugee Source).
16. 27 June 52 - An enemy gasoline storage consisting of 2,000 drums of gasoline, is located at YD418043, near KMAN-NI (YD411042). This gasoline is stored in 19 trenches. The trenches are camouflaged with trees and grass (AIIR 492-7-52, F-) (Refugee Source).
17. 28 June 52 - An enemy fuel storage, consisting of 4,000 drums of gasoline, is located at YD426356. This fuel is stored in 50 trenches (AIIR 493-7-52, F-) (Refugee Source).
18. 27 June 52 - An enemy food storage, consisting of 9,000 bags of flour, is located at YD418065, near HAGONO-DONG (YD419057). These bags are stored in 15 piles by the side of a double track railroad which operates to an unknown destination. These piles are spaced at 50 meter intervals, and are individually covered with a black tarpaulin (AIIR 492-7-52, F-) (Refugee Source).

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19. 27 June 52 - An enemy food storage, consisting of 7,000 bags of millet and 10,000 bags of flour, is located at YD407322. This food is stored in 30 houses, camouflaged with straw. Three (3) CCF personnel, armed with an unknown number of PPSH submachine guns, are posted as security guard in this area (AIR 493-7-52, F-) (Refugee Source).

20. 12 July 52 - An enemy food storage, consisting of 200 bags of rice, 100 bags of soy beans, and 50 bags of millet, is located at YC288541. This food is stored in four (4) trenches (AIR 497-7-52, F-) (Refugee Source).

21. 10 July 52 - An enemy radar site, consisting of ten (10) straw roofed houses, and seven (7) tile roofed houses is located at BT599540. This site is composed of one (1) screen with four (4) white wires, 70 centimeters long, 60 centimeter wide, and two (2) white wires running diagonally on the screen. This screen is supported by a black wooden pole, one and seven tenths (1.7) meters long and ten (10) centimeters in diameter. An anti-air trench, of unknown dimensions, was observed near the radar set with two (2) twisted wires leading from the screen to the trench. The antenna rotates at a 360 degree angle. An unknown number of enemy personnel are utilized to operate and maintain this set. An anti-aircraft gun position, consisting of one (1) 45mm anti-tank gun and one (1) 75mm anti-aircraft gun, is located 40 meters south of the radar site. Two (2) telephone wires connect the site with the gun position, and two (2) electric wires lead from the radar site in the direction of SHIMAN (BT585555). This site is camouflaged with high grass (AIR 493-7-52, F-) (Refugee Source).

22. 15 July 52 - A CCF troop concentration, consisting of 1,000 personnel, is located at SANUM-NI (BT610099). These personnel are equipped with 70 horses, 600 Russian carbines, 20 PPSH submachine guns, and 2,000 hand grenades. They are billeted in 50 village houses of unknown dimensions (AIR 495-7-52, F-) (Refugee Source).

The following UN-EVALUATED information has been compiled from Air Intelligence Information Reports, Headquarters, Fifth Air Force, Detachment #2, 6004th AISS.

1. Date Unknown - An enemy radar unit is located at YC308663, near Pukkul (YC307635). This unit is situated at the top of a small hill and is equipped with a circular inclosure of sand bags five (5) meters in diameter. The radar unit observed was a metallic frame 1.8 meters long and one (1) meter wide. This frame is symmetrically mounted on a horizontal metal rod eight (8) meters long. The unit rotates 360 degrees. This radar unit is operated by five (5) or six (6) CCF troops. The personnel work in two (2), 12 hour shifts daily. Two (2) 70mm anti-aircraft guns "Stalin" type, are located 50 meters south, and 80 meters east of the radar unit. The guns are camouflaged with blue colored nettings, with the barrels camouflaged with straw. Ammunition for these guns is stored in small straw huts located three (3) meters from each gun. (AIIR 471-7-52, F-) (Refugee Source).

2. 12 July 52 - A CCF anti-aircraft gun position, consisting of six (6) anti-aircraft guns, of an unknown type, and manned by 100 CCF personnel, armed with an unknown number of pistols, hand grenades, and PPSH sub-machine guns is located at CU502688, near Kowon (CU492660). Each gun is spaced at ten (10) meter intervals and camouflaged with natural foliage. Six (6) CCF personnel, armed with PPSH sub-machine guns and Russian rifles, are utilized to guard this area. (AIIR 470-7-52, F-) (Refugee Source).

3. 10 July 52 - A CCF anti-aircraft pom-pom gun position, consisting of six (6) anti-aircraft pom-pom guns, is located at CU500670, near Kowon (CU492660). These guns are installed in six (6) trenches, and camouflaged by straw nets and grass. These guns are manned by 100 CCF personnel, armed with an unknown number of PPSH sub-machine guns, Russian rifles, pistols and three (3) hand grenades per individual. Seven (7) CCF personnel, armed with Russian rifles, are utilized to guard this area. (AIIR 470-7-52, F-) (Refugee Source).

4. 1 July 52 - A CCF anti-aircraft pom-pom position, consisting of five (5) anti-aircraft pom-pom guns installed in five (5) trenches, is located at CU491676, near Tokchi (CU493676). Each trench is two (2) meters wide and one (1) meter deep, spaced at ten (10) meter intervals. These guns are manned by 100 CCF personnel, armed with an unknown number of PPSH sub-machine guns, Russian rifles, pistols, and three (3) hand grenades per individual. Four (4) CCF personnel, armed with PPSH sub-machine guns, are utilized to guard this area. (AIIR 470-7-52, F-) (Refugee Source).

5. 26 June 52 - An NKPA boat concealment, consisting of two (2) motor boats, each three (3) meters wide and ten (10) meters long, seven (7) sailboats, each 3.5 meters wide and 12 meters long, five (5) sailboats, each 3.2 meters wide, and ten (10) meters long, and eight (8) rubber boats, two (2) meters wide and five (5) meters long is located at YB087975. Two (2) NKPA personnel and one (1) civilian are assigned to each boat. Four (4) NKPA personnel, armed with PPSH sub-machine guns and Russian carbines, guard these boats. (AIIR 477-7-52, C-) (Confidential Source).

6. 27 June 52 - An NKPA boat concealment, consisting of five (5) sailboats, each three (3) meters wide and nine (9) meters long, three (3) sailboats, each 2.5 meters wide and eight (8) meters long, and four (4) boats, each two (2) meters wide and 4.5 meters long, is located at YB115882, near Chukkam (YB118877). These boats are stored in this area at 240 meters intervals on the mud flats. Two (2) NKPA personnel, armed with PPSH sub-machine guns, guard these boats. (AIIR 477-7-52, C-) (Confidential Source).

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7. 20 July 52 - An enemy temporary railroad bridge is located at CU497673, near Kowon (CU492660). This bridge is constructed of wood and is five (5) meters wide, 200 meters long, and 20 meters above the surface of the water. Traffic on this bridge operates between 0200 and 0300 hours. Trains operating between Kowon (CU497673) and Hanhung (CU745185), transport munitions. These trains are guarded by an unknown number of NKPA personnel, armed with rifles. (AIIR 470-7-52, F-) (Refugee Source).

8. 5 July 52 - The railroad between Kowon (CU497673) and Wonsan (CU590350), is in operation between 2100 and 0400 hours. Traffic on this railroad consists of five (5) locomotives and 80 freight cars. These trains carry munitions from Kowon to Wonsan. Trains traveling between Wonsan and Kowon have no cargo. When damaged this railroad is repaired by an NKPA Reconstruction Unit. These personnel have their supplies stored at the Kowon Railroad Station (CU493683). During the last J bombing 15 freight cars and 18 oxen were destroyed. These oxen were being sent to front line areas to be utilized by front line personnel. High explosive bombs destroy an area seven (7) meters deep and 20 meters in diameter. It takes three (3) days to repair this type of bomb damage. All repair work on this rail line is done at night. (AIIR 470-7-52, F-) (Refugee Source).

9. 10 June 52 - An enemy under water bridge is located at YC349621. This bridge is constructed ten (10) centimeters under the surface of the water 100 meters long, and six (6) meters wide. 40 civilian personnel were observed constructing this bridge. (AIIR 478-7-52, F-) (Refugee Source).

10. 25 June 1952 - The 81st Allied Troop Unit, consisting of an unknown number of CCF and NKPA personnel, is located at YB151873, near Sigyo-ri (YB144854). The 1st Company of this unit is located in 20 civilian houses in Kwangchon-ri (YB151873), South Korea. The 2nd Company of this unit, consisting of 25 personnel, is located at Sokkyo (YB195841). These personnel are billeted in ten (10) civilian houses. The 3rd Company of this unit, consisting of 22 personnel located at Hyangga-ri (YB229810). The mission of this allied unit is to protect the coastal area. Each company is equipped with 17 M-1 (US make) rifles, three (3) PPSH sub-machine guns, and four (4) hand grenades per individual. Once each month each company has a meeting of the Peoples Democratic Youth and Committee Members. (AIIR 479-7-52, F-) (POW Lee Chong Oh (李鍾五) Source).

11. 24 June 52 - A Farmer Troop Unit, consisting of an unknown number of personnel, is located at YB160831, near Sokpo-ri (YB159833). These personnel are equipped with an unknown number of PPSH sub-machine guns, Russian rifles, M-1 (US made) rifles, and hand grenades. These personnel are billeted in four (4) civilian houses. These personnel utilize one (1) civilian house as the Company Headquarters, in which the Company Commander and the Political Committee Chief have their offices. These personnel also utilize one (1) civilian house, eight (8) meters long, three (3) meters wide, and four (4) meters high, as a warehouse, in which is stored seventy (70) bags of ammonia fertilizer, ten (10) bags of grain, and ten (10) bags of rice. The rice, that is stored in this warehouse, was transported from Sinchon (YC157472), North Korea. The warehouse and the billets are guarded by one (1) soldier, armed with a PPSH sub-machine gun. Guards work in shifts of two (2) hours and are checked each hour by the sergeant of the guard. These personnel are engaged in farming in each village in this area. (AIIR 479-7-52, F-) (POW Lee Chong Oh (李鍾五) Source).

12. 21 June 1952 - An NKPA troop concentration, consisting of 200 personnel, is located at BT491008. These personnel are equipped with one (1) Russian mortar, 20 Maxim heavy machine guns, five (5) madsen light machine guns, and an unknown number of Russian rifles, PPSH sub-machine guns, 200 rounds of ammunition for each PPSH sub-machine gun, and 150 rounds of ammunition for each Russian rifle. These personnel are billeted in 45 village houses. (AIIR 476-7-52, F-) (Refugee Source).

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13. 17 June 52 - A CCF troop concentration, consisting of 500 personnel, is located at YC378120. These personnel are armed with five (5) heavy machine guns, 17 light machine guns, 380 Russian carbines, 120 PPSH sub-machine guns, and 1000 hand grenades. 300 of these personnel are billeted in five (5) zinc roofed houses. (AIIR 478-7-52, F-) (Refugee Source).

14. 20 June 52 - An NKPA troop concentration, consisting of 200 personnel, of the 5th Division, is located at YC027985, near Samhwa (YC022987). These personnel are equipped with two (2) 60mm mortars, three (3) heavy machine guns, six (6) light machine guns, 60 PPSH sub-machine guns, 50 Russian carbines, and 600 hand grenades. They are billeted in an unknown number of village houses in this area. Two (2) NKPA roving guards patrol this area. (AIIR 477-7-52, C-) (Confidential Source).

15. 2 July 1952 - An enemy mortar position, consisting of three (3) 82mm mortars, is located at CT574445. These mortars are installed in three (3) trenches, each one (1) meter deep, 1.3 meters in diameter, and spaced at eight (8) meter intervals. The barrels protrude 30 centimeters above the camouflage, consisting of pine tree branches. These mortars are manned by 12 personnel, billeted in one (1) bunker near the positions. (AIIR 473-7-52, F-) (POW Chiu Kwang Lu (朱光祿) Source).

16. 2 July 1952 - An enemy heavy machine gun position, consisting of six (6) heavy machine guns, is located at CT568442. These guns are installed in one (1) trench, eight (8) meter deep, five (5) meters wide, and ten (10) meters long. These guns are camouflaged with pine branches and each gun is manned by three (3) personnel billeted in one (1) trench near the gun position.

2. 28 May 1952 - The 2nd, 4th, and 6th Transportation Battalion are located at BU965473, near Yangdok (BU968432). The vehicles assigned to this unit are utilized for transporting supplies which are unloaded from trains at the YANGDOK Railroad Station (BU969437) (AIR 456-7-52, F-) (Refugee Source).
3. 28 May 1952 - A CCF Transportation Company, not attached to the Transportation Department, Northern General Headquarters, is located at CU607165, near Sagi-ri (CU611165). The officers of this unit are located at CU610165, in the western sector of Sagi-ri. (AIR 456-7-52, F-) (Refugee Source).
4. 28 May 1952 - The headquarters of the 3rd Transportation Battalion, is located at CU613170, near Sagi-ri (CU611165). An unknown number of trenches have been constructed in this area for storing fuel and rations. (AIR 456-7-52, F-) (Refugee Source).
5. 28 May 1952 - The 8th Transportation Battalion is located at CU690003, near Kosan-ri (CU684997). This unit is utilized to transport ammunition and fuel from CI869820 and CU664208, to the frontline (AIR 456-7-52, F-) (Refugee Source).
6. 28 May 1952 - The 7th and 9th Transportation Battalion are located at FUYONGJANG (YD406348) (AIR 456-7-52, F-) (Refugee Source).
7. 28 May 1952 - An enemy vehicle repair shop, under the supervision of the Transportation Department, is located at YD240560, near Yongyu (YD243532) (AIR 456-7-52, F-) (Refugee Source).
8. 9 May 1952 - An enemy radar installation is located at H1904421, near Sibyon-ni (H1990420). The antenna is 25 centimeters in diameter. This radar is installed immovable and is operated by an unknown number of CCF personnel. Seven (7) 75mm antiaircraft guns are installed in trenches, each three (3) meters in diameter and spaced at six (6) meter intervals near the radar site. Two (2) Telephones are used to communicate between the gun positions and the radar site. Two (2) CCF personnel, armed with Russian rifles, patrol this area (AIR 450-7-52, F-) (Refugee Source).
9. May 1952 - An enemy troop concentration, consisting of 1000 personnel, is located at DI185645, near SANGSUNGAM-NI (DI172642). These personnel are equipped with an unknown number of Russian submachine guns, Russian rifles and pistols. Corps Commanders: Major General YU KYONG SU (柳景洙) (Korean), age 30. Chief of Staff: Brigadier General PARK KONG PA (朴公坡) (Korean), age 30. Organization: Propaganda Battalion, Security Department, Court Engineer Department, Communications and Supply Battalion. They are billeted in 30 air-raid shelters. These shelters are camouflaged with pine branches. One (1) guard is posted at each shelter and on the road at 100 meter intervals. These personnel are equipped with an unknown number of jeeps. (AIR 452-7-52, F-) (OH SHIN DONG HYUN (申東鎭) Source).

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10. 7 July 1952 - An NKPA troop concentration, consisting of 130 troops, is located at YC450029, near Tojong-dong (YC448309). The equipment of these personnel is unknown. The troops are billeted in six (6) trenches (AIR 454-7-52, F-) (Refugee Source).

11. 7 July 1952 - A CCF Engineer Unit, consisting of 1,300 personnel, armed with 700 Type 99 (Japanese made) rifles, 500 Hsk-41 submachine guns, 20 Gerand caliber 30 M-1 (US made) rifles, and an unknown number of hand grenades, is located at YD394198, near the Taedong Geng Railroad Station (YD386182). These personnel are billeted in a building, 100 meters long, 15 meters wide, and three (3) stories high. One (1) CCF personnel, armed with a Type 99 (Japanese made) rifle is utilized to guard the entrance to this building. (AIR 457-7-52, F-) (Refugee Source).

12. 26 June 1952 - A CCF troop concentration, consisting of 400 personnel is located at BP399623, near Hungsuri (BP410610). These troops are armed with two (2) trench mortar guns (Russian make), four (4) Russian heavy machine guns, eight (8) Chinese 11mm submachine guns, type 36, and an unknown number of Russian rifles and submachine guns. These troops are billeted in six (6) anti-aircraft trenches. Supplies are transported here two (2) times a month from the Sariwon area North Korea. One (1) guard armed with a Russian rifle, is posted here during the day and one (1) guard patrols the area at night (AIR 459-7-52, C-) (Confidential source).

13. 5 July 1952 - 120 NKPA Naval personnel, armed with an unknown number of Russian rifles, FPSH submachine guns, and two (2) hand grenades per man, are located in Chungbochu-ri (DV285935). These troops are billeted in village houses. They are utilized for the defense of the coastal area. Six (6) men are utilized to guard the village at night. (AIR 459-7-52, F-) (Refugee Source).

14. Date Unknown - 200 NKPA reconstruction personnel are located, in bunkers, at DV341334, near Sinho-ri (DV344932). The rail supplies for these personnel are located at DV330317, near Sinpo-ri (DV324315). These personnel are utilized to repair damaged tracks and railroad bridges (AIR 463-7-52, F-) (Refugee Source).

15. 29 June 1952 - A CCF troop concentration, consisting of 300 personnel, is located at YC548512, near Teegue-ri (YC541505). These personnel are equipped with four (4) heavy machine guns, seven (7) light machine guns, an unknown number of FPSH submachine guns and Russian rifles, and two (2) hand grenades per individual. They are billeted in six (6) trenches. These trenches are camouflaged with straw mats and pine branches (AIR 466-7-52, F-) (Refugee Source).

16. 1 July 1952 - An NKPA troop concentration, consisting of 200 personnel, is located at BP607085, near Koup-ni (BP607086). These personnel are equipped with five (5) light machine guns, 82 FPSH submachine guns, 70 Russian rifles, 12 pistols, and 400 hand grenades. They are billeted in 40 civilian houses of unknown size (AIR 468-7-52, F-) (Refugee Source).

17. 2 July 1952 - An NKPA troop concentration, consisting of 300 personnel is located at BP652997, near Hodu-ri (BP657999). These personnel are equipped with six (6) light machine guns, 120 FPSH submachine guns, 100 Russian rifles, and 18 pistols. They are billeted in caves. These caves are camouflaged with pine trees. Each cave entrance is guarded by one (1) sentry armed with a Russian rifle. The mission of this unit is to defend the coastal area. (AIR 486-7-52, F-) (Refugee Source).

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11 August 1952

18. 7 July 1952 - An enemy food storage, consisting of 12,000 bags of wheat, is located at YC424972, near the Mukkyo Railroad Station (YC 425975). The wheat is stored in 45 stacks. These stacks are camouflaged with pine branches (AIR 457-7-52, F-) (Refugee Source).

19. 6 July 1952 - An enemy food storage, consisting of 105,000 bags of wheat flour, is located at YD424054, near the Chungnye Railroad Station (YD421040). This wheat flour is stored in 90 stacks. These stacks are camouflaged with branches. 14 CCF personnel are utilized to guard this storage (AIR 457-7-52, F-) (Refugee Source).

20. 5 July 1952 - An NKPA antiaircraft battery, consisting of 50 personnel, armed with two (2) antiaircraft machine guns and six (6) antiaircraft guns of unknown caliber, is located at YD390201. These guns are installed in eight (8) gun emplacements. (AIR 457-7-52, F-) (Refugee Source).

21. 20 May 1952 - A Russian antiaircraft battery, consisting of two (2) 85mm M1939 (Russian made) antiaircraft guns and four (4) 76mm M1938 (Russian made) antiaircraft guns, is located at X204388, near the Sinuiju Airfield (X2190393). These guns are installed in six (6) gun emplacements. Six (6) Russian personnel are utilized to maintain and operate each gun. A RUSS-11 (Russian made) radar set is installed ten (10) meters west of these gun emplacements. This radar set consists of a rake type antenna installed on a pole, 70 centimeters long. This pole is installed in the center of a radar mount, two (2) meters high, two (2) meters wide, and two (2) meters long. The antenna revolves in a clockwise direction, three (3) times a minute (AIR 458-7-52, F-) (Refugee Source).

22. 15 April 1952 - A Russian antiaircraft battery, consisting of three (3) 85mm M1939 (Russian made) antiaircraft guns and four (4) 76mm M1938 (Russian made) antiaircraft guns, is located at X249403, near Sinuiju Airfield (X2190393). These guns are installed in seven (7) gun emplacements, each five (5) meters in diameter and 1.3 meters deep, spaced at 20 meters intervals. Six (6) Russian personnel, dressed in CCF uniforms, are utilized to operate and maintain a radar mount installed on a GMC (US made) truck. The radar mount is 2.1 meters high, four (4) meters long, and 2.5 meters wide. Two (2) bowl shaped antennas, each 70 centimeters in diameter and spaced at ten (10) centimeter intervals, are mounted on the back wall of the radar mount. These antennas move up and down, every 15 seconds. One (1) Russian personnel, armed with a Russian rifle, is utilized to guard this radar set (AIR 458-7-52, F-) (Refugee Source).

23. June 1952 - An enemy antiaircraft gun position, consisting of two (2) antiaircraft guns and three (3) antiaircraft machine guns, is located at YD573618, near Chonggyejang (YC564610). These guns are located in five (5) trenches. 50 NKPA personnel are assigned to operate these guns. They are billeted in an unknown number of village houses (AIR 464-7-52, F-) (Refugee Source).

24. 27 May 1952 - The NKPA 53rd Hospital, consisting of 11 wards, is located at Lungari (X2934056). This hospital is equipped with one (1) operating room, one (1) roentgen room, and each ward has a medical treatment room, mess hall, and a food storage. The hospital staff consists of 40 NKA doctors, 50 Hungarian doctors, and 400 nurses who are administering medical treatment to 3,500 patients. Each ward of this hospital is situated at different locations. The 1st and 3rd ward is located at QWJU-DONG (X2933037), and is utilized as a recuperating ward. A specialist who administers treatment for the nose, ear, and throat is assigned to the 3rd ward. The 7th ward consisting of 30 civilians a medical treatment room, mess hall, and a recuperation room. The 8th ward, consisting of 40 civilian houses, and two (2) main buildings, is located at Songnam-dong (X2973061). The 9th ward, consisting of 30 civilian houses, is located at X2952068. Patients are also accepted and treated in the 9th ward. Source stated the above mentioned wards were the only ones that he observed. This hospital has a serious shortage of medical supplies,

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but such medicines as mercurochrome, iodine, and other disinfectants are plentiful (AIR 461-7-52, F-) (LOW CHAE JAE UEN (L. C. U.) Source).

11 August 1952

The following UN-EVALUATED information has been compiled from Air Intelligence Information Reports, Headquarters, Fifth Air Force, Detachment #2, 6004th AHS.

1. April 1952 - An enemy tank concealment, consisting of two (2) T-34/85 (Russian made) tanks, is located at CV869080, near CHUNGHUNG-NI (CV867083). These tanks are camouflaged with nets (AIIR 430-7-52, F-) (Refugee Source).

2. April 1952 - An enemy tank concealment consisting of one (1) T-34/85 (Russian made) tank, is located at SOEJOIN (CV839087). This tank is concealed in a cave (AIIR 430-7-52, F-) (Refugee Source).

3. April 1952 - One (1) T-34/85 (Russian made) tank is concealed in a cave at GUMTO-RI (CV48076) (AIIR 430-7-52, F-) (Refugee Source).

4. April 1952 - One (1) T-34/85 (Russian made) tank, camouflaged with nets, is located at HONAM-NI (CV816102) (AIIR 430-7-52, F-) (Refugee Source).

5. April 1952 - Two (2) SU-76 selfpropelled guns (Russian made) are located at NUNGJON-NI (CV866137) (AIIR 430-7-52, F-) (Refugee Source).

6. 20 April 1952 - An enemy tank repair shop is located at CHONGI-RI (CV825118). The repair shop is situated in a zinc sheet metal and wood building, 12 meters long, six (6) meters wide, and four (4) meters high. Ten (10) NKPA personnel are utilized to work in this repair shop, and one (1) platoon of NKPA personnel is utilized as guards (AIIR 430-7-52, F-) (Refugee Source).

7. 1 June 1952 - A prisoner-of-war camp is located in the center of NAMJONG-NI (BT724962), near the SUAN gold mine (BT726962). The exact amount of POW's at this camp was unknown to source, however he observed 15 American personnel and 25 ROKA personnel. The POW compound is composed of ten (10) buildings located on both sides of a main road leading into CHANG-DONG (BT734965). Each building is eight (8) meters long, four (4) meters wide, two and five tenths (2.5) meters high, and contain four (4) rooms. One (1) sentry, armed with a PPSH sub-machine gun, is posted at the entrance to the camp. No inhabitants live around this camp and only 15 North Korean Policemen are stationed in this area. The prisoners are given three (3) meals each day consisting of beans, millet, Chinese broom corn, and very little rice. Each day they are mobilized and receive communist indoctrination. Source observed the prisoners were clothed in North Korean uniforms, American made fatigues, and North Korean shoes. Each day the prisoners are mobilized to work for a period of ten and one half (10 1/2) hours at the SUAN gold mine located at BT726962, and another mine at BT723966. Two (2) NKPA personnel accompany the prisoners when they are sent to labor assignments. The NKPA sentries are lenient with the prisoners and often offer them cigarettes and carry on a conversation with them. Source stated the POW's are in poor health due to lack of food and overwork. An average of one (1) prisoner per month has died at this camp. All POW's in poor health are given medical treatment at the mine hospital, utilized as a dispensary. The dispensary is equipped with very little medical supplies. Source stated this camp is permanent (AIIR 443-7-52, G-) (Confidential Source).

8. 8 June 1952 - An enemy agent school is located in one (1) civilian houses in the center of CHOK-ROU (BT482614). The word (Agent school) is written on a piece of paper and placed on the door. This school consists of 20 male and ten (10) female students. These personnel enrolled in this school on the 1st of May 1952 for a three (3) month term. The school has two (2) male and one (1) female instructor. Food supplies for this school are transported from the MASAN-HYON civilian committee three (3) times each month. All civilian personnel are prohibited from this area. This agent school was moved to this location on 3 May 1952, from the NAMCHON area (AIIR 447-7-52, F-) (Refugee Source).

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9. 27 May 1952 - An enemy radar and antiaircraft gun unit, consisting of an unknown number of radar sets, 240 personnel of which 120 are technical officers with rank higher than 2nd Lieutenant, and 20 antiaircraft guns, is located at SAMAL (YC391628). These personnel are armed with 30 PPSH submachine guns, 85 US M-1 rifles, and 125 pistols. The radar sets are all immovable. The antennas are ten (10) meters in diameter and consist of four (4) wires diagonally crossing the screen. These antennas are installed in an unknown number of trenches, each one (1) meter wide, two (2) meters high, and 20 meters long. These personnel are equipped with one (1) wireless radio used to tap friendly traffic and to jam friendly contacts. This location is camouflaged with a natural growth of Accacia trees, and the gun position is camouflaged with pine tree branches and leaves. This unit is equipped with one (1) large and three (3) small radios. This unit has never been bombed by UN aircraft (AIR 443-7-52, C-) (Confidential Source).

10. 30 June 1952 - An enemy troop concentration, consisting of 200 personnel, is located at DA285176, near FUNG-SAN (DA292181). These personnel are equipped with an unknown number of US Springfield "0-3" rifles, US carbines, 11mm submachine guns, and two (2) trucks. They are billeted in civilian houses in nearby villages, and their headquarters is located in one (1) anti-air trench in a rice paddy at DA285176. The primary mission of this unit is to assault UN paratroopers in this area (AIR 445-7-52, F-) (Refugee Source).

11. 18 June 1952 - A CCF troop concentration, consisting of 140 troops, is located at TA20-DONG (EU468377). These personnel are equipped with five (5) pistols, 50 Russian carbines, 30 PPSH submachine guns, 200 hand grenades, and 20 Japanese rifles. They are billeted in the village houses. Three (3) CCF guards are posted in this area (AIR 429-7-52, F-) (Refugee Source).

12. 20 June 1952 - A CCF troop concentration, consisting of 180 troops, is located at CHI-NI (BU476366). These personnel are armed with seven (7) pistols, 60 Russian carbines, 30 Japanese rifles, 50 PPSH submachine guns, and 360 hand grenades. They are billeted in 40 village houses. One (1) guard is posted in this area (AIR 425-7-52, F-) (Refugee Source).

13. 23 June 1952 - A CCF troop concentration, consisting of 400 personnel, is located at YC511043, near HASONOTAN (YC511042). These personnel are equipped with three (3) light machine guns, two (2) hand grenades per individual, one (1) pistol per each officer, and an unknown number of PPSH submachine guns and Russian rifles. They are billeted in one (1) tiled roof house, utilized as battalion command post, and three (3) anti-air trenches. 140 personnel are assigned to the command post and 90 personnel occupy the anti-air trenches. All supplies for these personnel are transported from HAEJU (YC380135), by vehicles. The mission of these personnel is to guard the coastal area (AIR 440-7-52, C-) (Confidential Source).

14. 23 June 1952 - An NPA troop concentration, consisting of 200 personnel, is located near HWAJON (YC528025). These personnel are equipped with three (3) light machine guns, two (2) hand grenades per individual, and an unknown number of PPSH submachine guns and Russian rifles. These personnel are billeted in seven (7) anti-air trenches. One (1) anti-air trench is utilized as a command post. These trenches are camouflaged with pine branches. The mission of these personnel is to guard the sea coast (AIR 440-7-52, C-) (Confidential Source).

15. 3 June 1952 - An enemy food storage, consisting of 1,000 bags of rice, 600 bags of flour, 400 bags of beans, and 20 drums of bean oil is located at YD39315, near TONGSO (YC39315). This food is stored in eight (8) stacks camouflaged with straw. Two (2) sentry posts, armed with machine guns, patrol the area (AIR 437-7-52, F-) (Refugee Source).

16. 28 June 1952 - An enemy gasoline storage, consisting of 1,500 drums of gasoline, is located at NI59-546, near GAYO-PONG (NI600167). This gasoline is stored in 190 trenches, located in a cherry orchard 100 meters square. Each trench is one (1) meter wide, one (1) meter deep, and (2) meters long. There are three and five tenths (3.5) meters long. This storage has one (1) roving guard (AIR 431-7-52, F-) (Refugee Source).

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17. 20 June 1952 - An enemy fish storage, consisting of 70 truck loads of fish, is located at XD346983, near SINCHON-NI (XD350983). The fish is stored in two (2) warehouses, one (1) warehouse is 150 meters long, 25 meters wide, and seven (7) meters high. The other is 70 meters long, 20 meters wide, and 15 meters high. Both warehouses are constructed of granite with black sheet metal roofs. (AIR 436-7-52, F-) (Refugee Source).

18. 10 June 1952 - An enemy food storage, consisting of 1,000 bags of unbulled rice, 500 bags of Korean hulled rice, 500 bags of beans, red beans, and indo-China rice is located in one (1) building in a valley at YC199472, near CHALRYONG (YC290525). This food storage was constructed in March 1952 (AIR 443-7-52, C-) (Confidential Source).

19. 28 May 1952 - The CHALRYONG vehicular highway bridge is located at YC358541, near CHALRYONG (YC290525). This bridge is 120 meters long, four (4) meters wide, and is supported by 30 wooden logs spaced at two (2) meter intervals. Three (3) logs are utilized at each support position and wooden boards are placed over each supporter. The traffic capabilities on this bridge is one (1) vehicle at a time. This bridge is utilized by vehicles, ox-cart, and 30 trucks loaded with munitions each night. The vehicles travel from SARIMON (YC395653), to CHALRYONG (YC290525), SINCHON (YC175472), and CHANGYON (YC835352). Source stated this bridge has not been bombed since November 1952 (AIR 443-7-52, C-) (Confidential Source).

20. 17 June 1952 - A highway bridge is located at BU411338, near HUNAM-RI (BU413339). This bridge is 110 meters long, and constructed one and five tenths (1.5) meters above the water. The bridge is supported by 11 logs, and its surface is covered with gravel. The bridge was constructed 10 March 1952 (AIR 429-7-52, F-) (Refugee Source).

21. 17 June 1952 - An enemy highway bridge is located at YD592333, near PAKCHONG (YD591333). This bridge is 125 meters long, three and five tenths (3.5) meters wide, and one and five tenths (1.5) meters above the water. The bridge is supported by logs and its surface is covered with gravel. The bridge was constructed on or about 10 March 1952 (AIR 429-7-52, F-) (Refugee Source).

22. 28 June 1952 - A CCF anti-aircraft gun position, consisting of two (2) 75mm anti-aircraft guns, is located at BT583561, near SINMLK (BT583553). These guns are installed in trenches. These gun positions were constructed on 10 May 1952. Each gun position is camouflaged with pine trees. These guns are operated by seven (7) CCF personnel each (AIR 431-7-52, F-) (Refugee Source).

23. 20 June 1952 - An enemy boat concealment, consisting of eight (8) 20 ton wooden boats, and three (3) 12 ton wooden boats, is located at XD345982, near SINCHON-NI (XD350983). Seven (7) civilian seamen are utilized to operate each boat. These boats had been used for fishing and transporting refugees. Now the boats are hidden day and night until they can become useful for communist purposes. These boats are camouflaged with pine branches (AIR 436-7-52, F-) (Refugee Source).

The following UNEVALUATED information has been compiled from Air Intelligence Information Reports, Headquarters, Fifth Air Force, Detachment #2, 6004th AISS.

1. Date Unknown - A contract was drawn up between Communist China and North Korea agreeing to the transportation of tungsten from a mine located in Sungchun (YD525673), North Korea, to An-Shan (WFO054) Manchuria. 300 Chinese technicians and miners are working at this mine. (AIIR 502-7-52, F-) (Refugee Source).
2. 17 June 52 - An enemy anti-aircraft gun position, consisting of eight (8) guns of unknown caliber, is located at CU632009, near Wiling-myon (CU636013). Each gun is installed in a trench 1.5 meters deep, and three (3) meters in diameter. They are spaced at 40 meter intervals. Five (5) or six (6) CCF troops are assigned to each gun, and are billeted in the village houses. The guns are camouflaged with netting and weeds. No guards were observed in this area. (AIIR 503-7-52 F-) (Refugee Source).
3. 5 July 52 - An enemy recoilless rifle position, consisting of seven (7) recoilless rifles, is located at CT053138, near Kuk-Koi (CT058136). These rifles are installed in seven (7) trenches, and camouflaged with pine branches and weeds. Four (4) personnel man each rifle. (AIIR 504-7-52, F-) PO: Tsai Ling Eul (蔡凌貴) source.
4. 10 July 52 - A CCF anti-aircraft gun position, consisting of five (5) anti-aircraft guns and three (3) anti-aircraft machine guns, is located at YD426102, near Sang-dong (YD420103). These guns are installed in eight (8) trenches. These trenches are camouflaged with rope nets and pine tree branches. Two (2) CCF personnel, armed with Russian rifles, guard this area. 50 CCF personnel are located in this area to operate these guns. (AIIR 513-7-52, F-) (Refugee Source).
5. Date Unknown - An NKPA anti-aircraft gun position, consisting of three (3) anti-aircraft guns manned by 15 NKPA personnel, is located at YD381198, near the Taedong-gang Bridge (YD378198). These guns are installed in three (3) trenches. The mission of this unit is to shoot down UN aircraft flying over this area. (AIIR 520-7-52, F-) (Refugee Source).
6. Date Unknown - An NKPA anti-aircraft gun position, consisting of three (3) anti-aircraft guns manned by 15 NKPA personnel, is located at YD343196, near Kujang-ni (YD355197). These guns are installed in three (3) trenches. The personnel are billeted in one (1) trench. (AIIR 520-7-52, F-) (Refugee Source).
7. Date Unknown - An NKPA anti-aircraft gun position, consisting of three (3) anti-aircraft guns, manned by 15 personnel, is located at YD395207, near the Taedong-gang Bridge (YD379190). These guns are installed in three (3) trenches. The personnel are billeted in one (1) trench, the mission of this unit is to destroy UN aircraft flying over this area. (AIIR 520-7-52, F-) (Refugee Source).
8. Date Unknown - An enemy anti-aircraft gun position, consisting of six (6) 75mm anti-aircraft guns, is located at YD409164. These guns are installed in six (6) trenches. This storage is operated by 50 NKPA personnel, armed with 30 rifles of unknown type, ten (10) PPSH sub-machine guns, ten (10) pistols, and 100 hand grenades. An unknown number of NKPA personnel, armed with PPSH sub-machine guns, are posted as security guards in this area. (AIIR 525-7-52, F-) (Refugee Source).

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9. 10 June 52 - An enemy food storage, consisting of 2000 bags of broom corn and 2000 bags of rice is located at Sokwangsa (CU626149). This food is stored in an unknown number of stacks, each 15 meters long, three (3) meters wide, one (1) meter high. This storage is camouflaged with green tents and weeds, and is guarded by rail-way employees who are working as laborers in this area. Provisions are received each night between 0100 and 0300 hours, by rail. The incoming trains are not unloaded until 0600 hours the next morning. At 2200 hours each night the provisions are transported to an unknown destination by truck. (AIIR 503-7-52, F-) (Refugee Source).

10. 5 July 52 - An enemy food storage, consisting of 3000^{bags} of flour, is located at YD421040. This food is stored in two (2) piles, each 2.5 meters high, 1.5 meters long and spaced at 100 meter intervals, camouflaged with grass. Two (2) CCF personnel, armed with an unknown number of Japanese type "99" rifles, are posted as security guard in this area. (AIIR 509-7-52, F-) (Refugee Source).

11. 20 June 52 - An enemy food storage, consisting of 3,000 bags of flour, 3100 bags of millet and 1,700 bags of beans, is located at YD417347. This food is stored in 12 stacks, and camouflaged with straw. Two (2) CCF personnel are posted as security guard in this area. (AIIR 519-7-52, F-) (Refugee Source).

12. 5 July 52 - An enemy food storage, consisting of 1000 bags of rice, 200 bags of millet, and 300 bags of broom corn is located at DV006494. These foods are stored in 15 storages. These storages are guarded by 12 home guard personnel, they are armed with wooden guns and broken rifles. This food was collected in the Hongwon-gun area as spot tax and was transported from this location once or twice a month, by horse-carts and an unknown number of trucks, to an unknown destination. (AIIR 524-7-52, F-) (Refugee Source).

13. 5 July 52 - An enemy ammunition storage, consisting of 600 rounds of 60mm mortar, 180 boxes of rifle ammunition, and an unknown number of hand grenades, is located at Taegang-myon (CT076143). This ammunition is stored in three (3) tunnels, 12 personnel, arms unknown, guard this storage, and are billeted in the tunnels. (AIIR 505-7-52, F-) (POW Tsai Ling Eul (蔡凌英) Source).

14. 10 January 52 - An enemy factory is located at BU500358. This factory is located in a cave and produces parts for PPSH sub-machine guns and Russian carbines. This factory is operated by 170 enemy personnel, billeted in an unknown number of shelters in the village of Chirye-ri (BU564364). These personnel are equipped with ten (10) lathes, two (2) Russian GAZ trucks, three (3) Russian ZIS trucks, and two (2) ox-carts. This area is surrounded by a barbed wire entanglement, and is guarded by one (1) NKPA soldier armed with one (1) PPSH sub-machine gun. (AIIR 506-7-52, F-) (Refugee Source).

15. 11 July 52 - An enemy vehicle concealment, consisting of 15 GMC (US make) trucks, eight (8) Russian trucks, and ten (10) Japanese trucks, is located at BT639-448, near Chongwae-san (BT636439). These trucks are located on both sides of a road, 15 trucks on the east side and 18 trucks on the west side. These trucks are camouflaged with nets, weeds, and a thick growth of trees. Two (2) NKPA personnel, armed with Russian rifles, guard these trucks. (AIIR 513-7-52, F-) (Refugee Source).

16. 22 July 52 - An NKPA troop concentration, consisting of 120 personnel, is located at BS421887. These personnel are equipped with one (1) direct firing gun, two (2) 60mm mortars, one (1) heavy machine gun, and two (2) light machine guns. They are billeted in four (4) houses two (2) NKPA personnel are posted as security guard in this area. (AIIR 515-7-52, F-) (Refugee Source).

17. 18 July 52 - An NKPA troop concentration, consisting of 170 personnel, is located at Milguji-dong (BS479906). These personnel are armed with four (4) light machine guns, six (6) PPSH sub-machine guns, 30 Russian carbines, and 340 hand grenades. They are billeted in 13 houses of unknown dimensions in this village. Two (2) NKPA personnel are posted as security guard in this area. (AIIR 515-7-52, F-) (Refugee Source).

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18. 18 July 52 - An NKPA troop concentration, consisting of 250 personnel, is located at B488884. These personnel are armed with one (1) heavy machine gun, three (3) light machine guns, 50 Russian carbines, and 500 hand grenades. They are billeted in seven (7) houses of unknown dimensions and 12 anti-air trenches. These trenches are camouflaged with grass. (AIIR 515-7-52, F-) (Refugee Source).

19. 30 June 52 - A prisoner-of-war camp, containing 50 British personnel, is located at YD382295, near Wasm-ni (YD388295). They receive 700 grams of food each day, and are suffering from malnutrition. These personnel are billeted in one (1) civilian house ten (10) meters long, and three (3) meters wide. Ten (10) CCF personnel, armed with Japanese (type 99) rifles, guard this prisoner-of-war camp. (AIIR 518-7-52, F-) (Confidential Source).

20. Date Unknown - A prisoner-of-war camp, containing 700 HOKA prisoners-of-war, is located at YD384237, near the Kirik-ni Railroad Station (YD386233). These prisoners are confined in a school building 70 meters long, ten (10) meters wide, and 15 meters high. These prisoners receive 600 grams of food per day. They are engaged in an unknown type of work in Pyongyang (YD385220). These prisoners are guarded by four (4) NKPA personnel, armed with PPSH sub-machine guns. (AIIR 520-7-52, F-) (Refugee Source).

21. Date Unknown - A prisoner-of-war camp, containing 1,000 HOKA prisoners-of-war, is located at YD372221, near Pyongyang (YD385220). These prisoners are confined in a school building 80 meters long, ten (10) meters wide, and 17 meters high. These prisoners receive 600 grams of food per day. They are engaged in carrying bricks from Pyongyang (YD385220), to the prisoner-of-war camp. They are guarded by four (4) NKPA personnel armed with PPSH sub-machine guns, details concerning the above information were unknown to source. (AIIR 520-7-52, F-) (Refugee Source).

22. Date Unknown - A prisoner-of-war camp, containing 400 HOKA personnel, is located at YD381239. These personnel are dressed in a blue uniform and are engaged in clearing the streets of Pyongyang (YD385220), six (6) NKPA personnel, armed with an unknown number of PPSH sub-machine guns, are posted as security guard in this area. (AIIR 525-7-52, F-) (Refugee Source).

23. Date Unknown - An enemy vehicular bridge is located at YD390210, near the Taedong-gang Bridge (YD378190). This bridge is 30 meters long, 15 meters wide, and ten (10) meters high. This bridge has been damaged by bombing and will support only personnel on foot. (AIIR 520-7-52, F-) (Refugee Source).

10 August 1952

The following UNEVALUATED information has been compiled from Air Intelligence Information Reports, Headquarters, Fifth Air Force, Detachment #2, 6004th AISS.

1. 15 July 1952 - An NKPA troop concentration, consisting of 600 personnel, is located at TONGSAN-NI (BS469889). These personnel are equipped with two (2) 60mm mortars, two (2) heavy machine guns, 50 PPSH submachine guns, and 400 Russian carbines. The duty of these personnel is to guard the coast. (AIIR 401-7-52, F-) (Refugee Source).

2. 15 July 1952 - An NKPA troop concentration, consisting of 700 personnel, is located at BS425882, near YONGJONG-NI (BS442882). These personnel are equipped with two (2) 60mm mortars, two (2) heavy machine guns, five (5) light machine guns, and one (1) anti-tank gun. The duty of these personnel is to guard the coast. (AIIR 401-7-52, F-) (Refugee Source).

3. 15 July 1952 - An NKPA troop concentration, consisting of 400 personnel, is located at BS414933, near CHONGGAE-NI (BS414932). These personnel are equipped with two (2) 82mm mortars, two (2) heavy machine guns, eight (8) light machine guns, 20 PPSH submachine guns, and 300 Russian rifles. (AIIR 401-7-52, F-) (Refugee Source).

4. 4 July 1952 - An NKPA gun position, consisting of three (3) unknown type guns, is located at YONAN-UP (BS498982). These guns are installed under trees at five (5) meter intervals. Three (3) personnel operate each gun. These personnel are billeted in a trench near the gun placements. Two (2) troops guard the area. (AIIR 402-7-52, F-) (Refugee Source).

5. 4 July 1952 - An NKPA troop concentration, consisting of 80 troops, is located at HAIYUL-TONG (BS486827). These personnel are armed with two (2) light machine guns, 20 PPSH submachine guns, 15 Russian carbines, and 160 hand grenades. These personnel are billeted in six (6) trenches, one (1) guard, armed with a PPSH submachine gun, is posted in the area. (AIIR 402-7-52, F-) (Refugee Source).

6. Date Unknown - As of 17 July 1952, the areas of WONSAN (CU650350), HAMBUNG (CV745180), and YOUNGHUNG (CU485785), have been completely cut off from electric current. This stoppage of electricity is the direct result of the general air attacks on power plants all over North Korea. North Korean authorities began a propaganda campaign after the strike at the CHONGJIN Power Plant (BS650250), claiming that the SUPUNG H-Plant would produce enough electricity for all. Since the SUPUNG H-Plant was bombed by UN Air attacks, reconstruction of power plants in North Korea has been practically impossible since 17 July 1952. It was reported that the dam at SUPUNG H-Plant had been so demolished that no Korean technicians could rebuild them. There is no rumor or propaganda to the effect that electricity will be furnished from somewhere in the USSR. The production of all factories and rice-mills in the WONSAN (CU650350), area and the YOUNGHUNG (CU485785) area North Korea, has been stopped because of the lack of electrical power. Local organizations in North Korea now use fish-oil, petroleum, gas, candles, etc. for lamplight. The water supply to the rice paddies in the area between YOUNGHUNG (CU485785), and CU630650, has been cut off since the power plant at SERYUCHON (CU373803), was destroyed by UN air attacks. This area along the YOUNGHUNG River had received its water supply for the rice plantations by electrical pumps. The dam of the reservoir is located at CU425790, near KORI'AL (CU410790). The farmers in this area said they faced the danger of starvation this year. The air raids on PYONGYANG (YD365220), and the HAMBUNG (CV745180) area, North Korea, are interpreted by the North Korean people as indicative of the UN's intention to launch a strong offensive. All of the factories and rice-mills in the TANCHON area (DW920750), and the LHMN (DW670635) area, are inoperative since the destruction of the TANCHON No. 4 Power Plant, as of 20 June 1952. (AIIR 406-7-52, G-) (Confidential Source).

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7. 17 July 1952 - A battalion strength of NKPA personnel moved northward passing the WONSAN (CU650355) area, North Korea, during the early part of July 1952. Since July 17, 1952, these personnel have been engaged in building a defense line in the KOWON (CU492660), YOUNGHUNG (CU485785), and SINSANG-NI (CU640890) areas. These personnel are temporarily stationed in the villages near the coast line, and are building trenches and gun positions on low ground and hills. According to the general public in these areas, these personnel are being re-formed upon their arrival from the front. (AIIR 406-7-52, C-) (Confidential Source).

8. Date Unknown - An unknown number of NKPA personnel are stationed at HODO-PANDO (CU750550), 150 personnel of an NKPA antiaircraft gun unit from CHEDO-RI (CU690604), began to move as of 10 July 1952, to the area of CHINSU-BONG (CU615696). These personnel are allegedly being reformed. There have been no fresh personnel on HODO-PANDO and CHEDO-RI as yet. (AIIR 406-7-52, C-) (Confidential Source).

9. Date Unknown - Confidential meetings have been held every day among the leading members of the local organizations of the North Korean Government in the YOUNGHUNG (CU485785), and KOWON (CU492660) areas, North Korea since the UN air strikes against the power plants, and the PYONGYANG (YD385220), and HAMHUNG (CV-745180), areas. Because of the air strikes on the major North Korean cities and the evidences of NKPA troops reforming the general public in these areas expect a new all-out UN offensive. The elements of rightists and anti-communists in North Korea recall the mass executions by the North Korean Government when they retreated in 1950, and now live in constant fear of another indiscriminate slaughter. As a result of the UN air raids on power plants and major North Korean cities, the people living in big cities, along the highways, and near the shore line are moving into mountain areas. The food situation in the area of YOUNGHUNG (CU485785), is very critical. Early this month, all the inhabitants, except those members of so-called anti-communist families, were given relief rice distributions by the local North Korean Government Organizations in the areas between WONSAN (CU650350), and HAMHUNG (CV745180), at the rate of two (2) liters per person, for 40 North Korean Won. Still this relief is not enough. The general public in these areas are living on sea-weeds, grass, and rice gruel. During the period from January to the middle of July 1952, an estimated 400 persons in eight (8) villages died of starvation. (AIIR 406-7-52, C-) (Confidential Source).

10. 1 July 1952 - An enemy locomotive concealment, consisting of an unknown number of rail cars, is located at DV333321. These cars are concealed in a tunnel. This tunnel has been previously bombed by friendly aircraft. (AIIR 417-7-52, F-) (Refugee Source).

11. 11 July 1952 - An enemy munitions storage, consisting of 100 bags of rice and 50 boxes of an unknown type of ammunition, is located at BS489936, near SONCHON-NI (BS489941). This storage is located in two (2) caves. (AIIR 420-7-52, F-) (Refugee Source).

12. 11 July 1952 - A CCF troop concentration, consisting of 700 troops is located at BT491011, near SONGHU-RI (BT489009). This unit is equipped with one (1) 80mm mortar gun, one (1) 62mm mortar, one (1) heavy machine gun, and ten (10) light machine guns. The personnel are billeted in ten (10) caves. (AIIR 420-7-52, F-) (Refugee Source).

13. 10 July 1952 - A CCF troop concentration, consisting of 700 troops is located at BS453897, near KACHYON-NI (BS449893). These personnel are equipped with two (2) 82mm mortars, two (2) heavy machine guns, ten (10) light machine guns and an unknown quantity of Russian rifles. They are billeted in five (5) caves. (AIIR 420-7-52, F-) (Refugee Source).

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14. Date Unknown - A prisoner-of-war camp is located at the KIRIM Primary School and another at the SOSONG School in PYONGYANG (YD385220). These two (2) prison camps have a total of 4,000 ROKA prisoners. Each of these prisoners receives 500 grams of broom corn per day. These prisoners are utilized in reconstruction work in PYONGYANG City (YD385220). A third prisoner-or-war camp is located at KANGDONG (BU490360). (AIR 425-7-52, F-) (Confidential Source).

The following UNEVALUATED information has been compiled from Air Intelligence Information Reports, Headquarters, Fifth Air Force, Detachment #2, 6004th AESS.

1. 14 July 1952 - An NKPA farming troop concentration, consisting of 200 personnel, is located at BS654969, near Kukkaun-dong (BS648975). These personnel are armed with two (2) light machine guns, 50 Russian rifles and 400 hand grenades. They are billeted in five (5) trenches. Each trench is camouflaged with grasses. One (1) guard is stationed at each trench (AIIR 336-7-52, F-)(Refugee Source).
2. 13 July 1952 - An NKPA troop concentration, consisting of 500 personnel, is located at BS684975, near Pangchuwon (BS684973). These personnel are equipped with two (2) 82mm mortars, six (6) heavy machine guns, ten (10) light machine guns, 200 Russian carbines, and 1000 hand grenades. They are billeted in five (5) caves. One (1) guard armed with a FFSH submachine gun is stationed at the entrance to each cave (AIIR 336-7-52, F-)(Refugee Source).
3. 18 July 1952 - The 301st North Korean Leather Factory is located at CU655308, near Kalma (CU677332), North Korea. The factory consists of four (4) buildings (AIIR 339-7-52, C-)(Confidential Source).
4. 18 July 1952 - A leather factory is located at CU658307, near Kalma (CU677332), North Korea. The factory consists of two (2) buildings (AIIR 339-7-52, C-)(Confidential Source).
5. 18 July 1952 - An NKPA shoe factory is located at CU655324, near Kalma (CU677332), North Korea. The factory is constructed underground (AIIR 339-7-52, C-)(Confidential Source).
6. 18 July 1952, - An NKPA battalion command post is located at CU666315, near Sedong-ni (CU668314), North Korea (AIIR 339-7-52, C-)(Confidential Source).
7. 18 July 1952, - An NKPA battalion command post is located at CU775305, near Jongna-ri (CU704327), North Korea (AIIR 339-7-52, C-)(Confidential Source).
8. 18 July 1952, - An NKPA battalion command post is located at CU901258, near Kangye-ri (CU906251), North Korea (AIIR 339-7-52, C-)(Confidential Source).
9. 18 July 1952 - An NKPA heavy machine gun company is located at CU904255, near Kangye-ri (CU906251), North Korea (AIIR 339-7-52, C-)(Confidential Source).
10. Date Unknown - A poison gas factory, established by the Chinese communists, is located at Meijenkou (Co-ordinates unknown), near Chang-chia-kou (40°51' - 114°54'), China. Russia, German and Japanese technicians are employed in this factory. It is strictly forbidden for anyone to enter the factory complex and is very heavily guarded. Dark colored liquid has been observed coming out of this factory (AIIR 380-7-52, F-)(Chinese Embassy).
11. Date Unknown - USSR atom bomb factory is located in the Sinkiang Province, China. A Soviet technician and Weng Wen Hao (翁文浩) (Chinese), discovered a great quantity of uranium buried in Ching kai-ti southwest of Ta-ko-pi, in Sinkiang Province. Russia has built a factory, to produce atom bombs, in this area, near the town of Saula, China. The factory director is (Airovsky) (艾罗夫斯基) (Russian), age unknown, and his associates are (WENG WEN HAO) (翁文浩) (Chinese), age unknown, and the missing British atom scientist (Fantekov) (范特科夫) (AIIR 380-7-52, F-)(Chinese Embassy).

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Collation Report No. 2 10 August 1952 (Cont'd)

12. 2 July 1952 - An enemy antiaircraft gun position, consisting of eight (8) 25mm guns, are located at YD391206, on the banks of the Taedong-jung river. 30 NKA personnel are assigned to operate these guns. These guns are emplaced in trenches (AIR 395-7-52, F-) (Refugee Source).

13. 3 July 1952 - An enemy food storage, consisting of 15,000 bags of millet, is located at YD348232, near Chokkui-tong (YD350232). This storage house is (7.2) meters long, seven (7) meters wide and six (6) meters high, with grey roof and walls (AIR 395-7-52, F-) (Refugee Source).

14. 3 July 1952 - An enemy locomotive concealment, consisting of two (2) locomotives, is located at YD358237, near Taetaryng-ni village (YD357236). These locomotives are concealed in two (2) houses six (6) meters high, with grey walls. This house is camouflaged with grass on the roof. These locomotives are guarded by locomotive engineers (AIR 395-7-52, F-) (Refugee Source).

15. 4 July 1952 - An enemy radar site, is located at YD378195, near the Taedong-gung Railroad Bridge (YD375193). The radar antenna is composed of ten (10) black metal wires and two black metal diagonals, the screen is 45 centimeters in diameter, supported by a wooden pole 2.5 tenths meters long. This radar antenna does not hum nor rotate. 12 NKA personnel are billeted in a grey tile roofed house, 20 meters west of the radar site (AIR 395-7-52, F-) (Refugee Source).

16. 3 July 1952 - An enemy radar site, is located at YD371191. The radar antenna is 30 centimeters square with 16 yellow metal wires, one (1) yellow horizontal wire and one (1) vertical wire. This antenna is supported by a pole 25 meters long and five (5) centimeters in diameter. No noise came from the antenna nor did it rotate. Three (3) meters east of the radar antenna four (4) 25mm anti-aircraft guns were installed. Each gun position is three (3) meters in diameter and 1.5 meters deep. Each gun is manned by three (3) NKA personnel (AIR 395-7-52, F-) (Refugee Source).

17. June 1952 - An unknown CCF Division moved into Fu-chou (JD3086), China, in the early (JD0314), China. (AIR 398-7-52, C-) (Chinese Embassy).

The following UNEVALUATED information has been compiled from Air Intelligence Information Reports, Headquarters, Fifth Air Force, Detachment #2, 6004th AISS.

1. 1 July 1952 - An NKPA Artillery gun position, consisting of three (3) 76mm Direct firing guns, is located at XC738585. These guns are installed in three (3) trenches. 400 rounds of ammunition for these guns is stored in each trench. The gun positions are camouflaged with straw nets and pine branches. Five (5) personnel are utilized to guard this area. (AIIR 217-7-52, C-) (Confidential Source).
2. 4 July 1952 - An NKPA troop concentration, consisting of 100 personnel, is located at XC786664. These personnel are equipped with four (4) 120mm mortars, two (2) heavy machine guns, two (2) light machine guns, 20 PPSH submachine guns, 40 Russian rifles, five (5) pistols, and three (3) hand grenades per individual. (AIIR 217-7-52, C-) (Confidential Source).
3. Date Unknown - An NKPA artillery gun position, consisting of three (3) 45mm direct firing guns, is located at XC753568. These guns are installed in three (3) trenches. 20 NKPA personnel, are utilized to operate these positions. 600 rounds of ammunition for the 45mm guns is stored in each trench. Nine (9) NKPA personnel guard this area. (AIIR 217-7-52, C-) (Confidential Source).
4. 15 June 1952 - A Russian anti-aircraft gun position, consisting of five (5) 57mm anti-tank guns and three (3) 37mm anti-aircraft machine guns, is located at XE225438. These guns are installed in eight (8) sand bagged positions. (AIIR 219-7-52, F-) (Refugee Source).
5. 8 July 1952 - An enemy food storage, consisting of 3,000 bags of wheat and 2,000 bags of barley, is located at XC658264. (AIIR 220-7-52, F-) (Refugee Source).
6. 5 July 1952 - An enemy food storage, consisting of 2,000 bags of rice, beans, corn, millet, and buckwheat is located at YC000750. These bags are stored in 12 separate trenches. (AIIR 221-7-52, F-) (Refugee Source).
7. 19 July 1952 - An NKPA troop concentration, consisting of 320 troops, is located at BS462951, near SONGCHON-NI (BS463953). The unit is designated as the 5th Battalion, 22nd Regiment, 4th Corps, NKPA. This unit is armed with two (2) 75mm Direct Firing guns, four (4) mortars, nine (9) heavy machine guns, 19 light machine guns, and an unknown number of PPSH submachine guns. The unit was equipped with an S.C.R. 649 radio, used to communicate with Regimental Headquarters and 4th Corps. Headquarters, located near NAMSAN (YC376123). (AIIR 228-7-52, F-) (Confidential Source).
8. 24 June 1952 - A CCF troop concentration, consisting of 2,000 personnel, is located at BT600547. These personnel are armed with 12 light machine guns, five (5) heavy machine guns, and an unknown number of PPSH sub-machine guns and Russian carbines. They are billeted in 20 anti-air trenches. (AIIR 230-7-52, F-) (Refugee Source).
9. 3 July 1952 - A CCF troop concentration, consisting of 600 personnel, is located at YD385346. These personnel are armed with 120 PPSH submachine guns, 200 Russian carbines, and 40 (Japanese made) type "38" rifles. They are billeted in 17 anti-air trenches. (AIIR 231-7-52, F-) (Refugee Source).

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Collation Report No.1 Dtd 10 August 1952 (Cont'd)

10. 21 June 1952 - An NKPA Supreme Headquarters, consisting of an unknown number of personnel, is located at YD421321, near H4ASOIG-NI (YD413320). These personnel are equipped with nine (9) anti-aircraft guns, 12 direct firing guns, eight (8) heavy machine guns, 15 light machine guns, five (5) mortars, and an unknown number of Russian rifles and PPSH submachine guns. Source observed an unknown number of high ranking officers passing this location on a secondary highway located near the anti-air trenches. KIM ILL SUNG (金日成) (Korean), was observed attending meetings at this headquarters several times. The morale of these personnel is very high. Three (3) radios are utilized to communicate with an unknown location. Ten (10) personnel are utilized to guard this area. (AIR 229-7-52, F-) (Refugee Source).

11. 18 June 1952 - A Korean shipyard, operated by the National SINUIJU Marine Product Office, is located at X4180394, near SINUIJU (X4190393). No buildings are in this area, but the ships are constructed in a wooded area using pine wood as drydocks. The average production of this shipyard is five (5) to seven (7) small fishing boats per month. Ten (10) ton capacity boats are the largest boats produced by this shipyard. (AIR 224-7-52, F-) (Refugee Source).

12. 20 June 1952 - An NKPA gunboat concealment is located at X4167207, near YONGAM-PO (X4175205). This concealment consists of two (2) 20 ton gunboats, similar to those used by the ROA Navy. They are anchored at 20 meter intervals, at the mouth of a river (name unknown). The ships are camouflaged by reefs. These vessels are in serviceable condition, in spite of the fact that they have been idle since 3 June 1952. A guard post is located at the top of the reef and is manned by a NK naval guard armed with a PPSH submachine gun. (AIR 224-7-52, F-) (Refugee Source).

SUBJECT: Soviet Antiaircraft Artillery in Korea

1. BACKGROUND: A large number of PWs and agents have reported the presence of Soviet-manned antiaircraft guns and Soviet antiaircraft units in the Sinuiju-Uiju area, many from direct observation. The majority of antiaircraft positions reported have been confirmed by aerial photography, and it is now estimated that there are a minimum of three Soviet antiaircraft divisions in the Sinuiju-Uiju-Antung area of Korea and Manchuria. However, these Soviet units have never been positively identified. 500th MISG Interrogation Report No KT 4101 indicates one division may be designated the 41st AAA Division. CCRAK Report No F-1669 indicates that one division may be designated the 37th AAA Division.

2. SPECIFIC REQUEST: In order to positively identify the Soviet antiaircraft units believed to be in the Sinuiju-Uiju-Antung area, the following information and material is requested:

- a. Documents, shoulderboards, or other similar items from the Sinuiju area which will identify the Soviet antiaircraft divisions disposed in that vicinity.
- b. Identifications and locations of Soviet antiaircraft divisions.
- c. Names of division and subordinate unit commanders.
- d. Dates of arrival of divisions or subordinate units in Korea, and in present location.
- e. Higher headquarters to which these divisions are subordinate and means of communication with that headquarters.

TO : See Distribution

1. BACKGROUND: Recent intelligence reports have referred to certain CCF units in the vicinity of SINGOSAN (CV 6303) or along the MSR south toward PYONGGANG (CT 5253), presence of which are currently unaccepted by this headquarters. However, observed vehicle traffic between SINGOSAN and PYONGGANG has increased considerably and may indicate either an attempted supply buildup, large enemy movements, or possibly both. If additional sizeable units are in the area of SINGOSAN or south toward PYONGGANG; other than those units currently accepted; it would represent a concentration of sizeable enemy reserves and would present a significant threat to the central sector of the UN line.

2. SPECIFIC REQUEST: It is desired that information pertaining to the presence of Communist troop concentrations, and identification and positions of sizeable troop units within the general SINGOSAN area (CV 6303) and along the main route south to PYONGGANG (CT 5253) be obtained.

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



DV318265 At Hill 179 one (1) platoon of the 578th North Korean Army Unit. (C-1-7/7/53-F).

2. There was a trench, 1.2 meters deep and one (1) meter wide, along the coast of MAYANG-DO. This primary defense system was manned by one (1) squad at every 500 meters. A secondary defensive trench system was 70 meters in the rear of the first. All the troops on the island were part of the 578th North Korean Army Unit and they were commanded by a lieutenant colonel. The soldiers were armed with PISH's or with 7.62mm, M1891/30, MOSSIN-NAGANT rifles. (C-1-7/7/53-F).

3. Construction of the MAYANG-DO defense system started in January 1953 and continued through March 1953. Labor was performed by 18 to 28 year old male and female members of the Democratic Youth League from the area between HUSCHAY (CV8010) and CHONGJIN (EE6826). (C-1-7/7/53-F).

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
